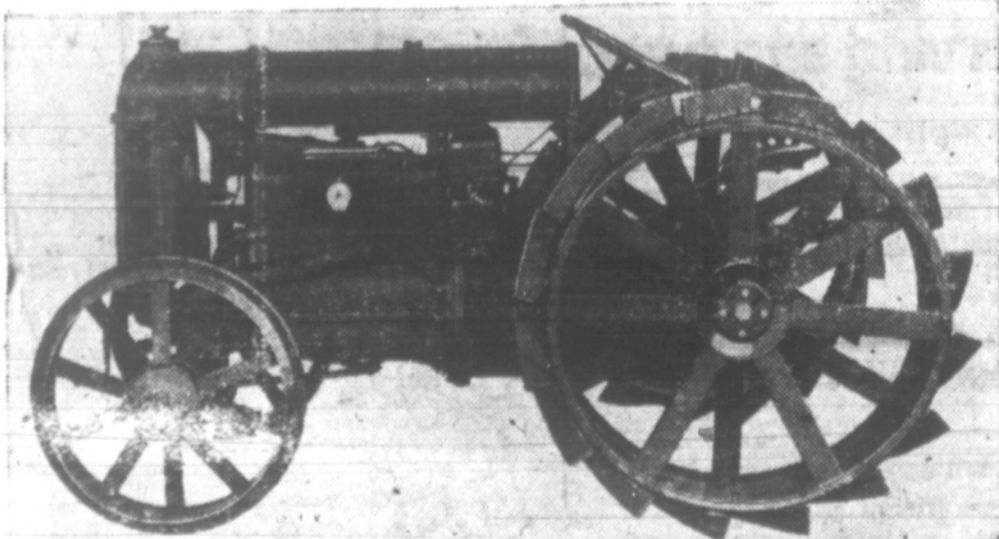

**Service From New City Reservoir**

This office has been asked at numerous times as to just what was the difference in elevation between the old and the new city reservoir. To settle the question authoritatively we requested Engineer H. S. Wall to furnish this office with accurate figures with the result that we can state positively that the bottom of the new reservoir is 25 feet 4 inches above the concrete top of the old reservoir. At the same time we requested data as to possible water supply to the cemetery and we again quote the same authority in stating that the supply to the I. O. O. F. cemetery will have a minimum fall of 15 to 20 feet, increasing in direct ratio any particular location may be from the south fence. Also we can state that part of the Baptist cemetery can also be supplied, probably not exceeding a 60 foot strip joining the lower cemetery.

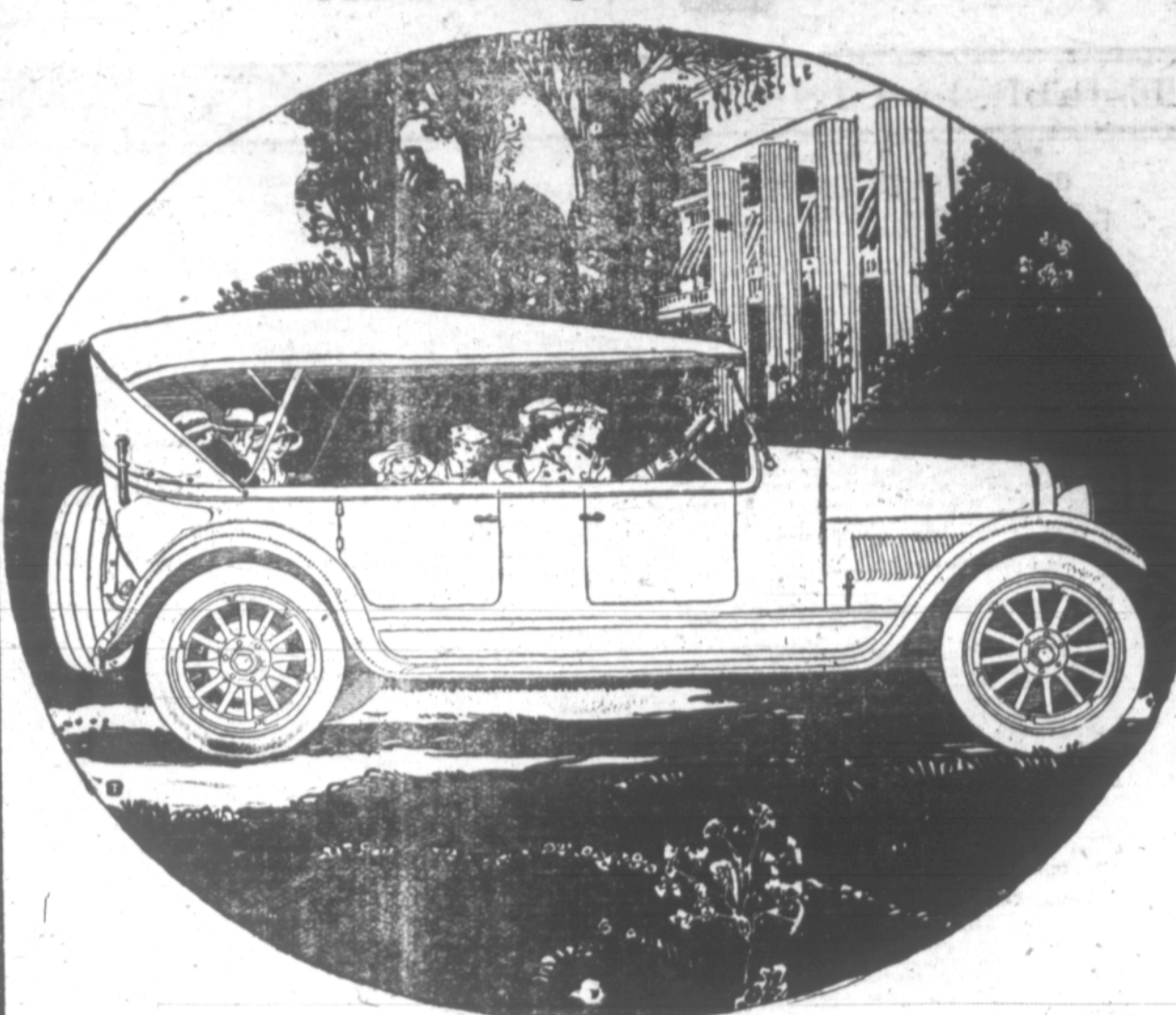
