Ben Crews arrived up from Portland Sunday evening where he has been receiving special treatment for his eyes. He expects to remain in Sherman county indefinitely.

The new service line to the reservoir being constructed has been cut into the pipe line supplying the old storage plant and the line is now rapidly being laid to the new location.

Home canners of fruit in this locality may anticipate the trend of prices for the coming season by the knowledge that one large canning establishment at The Dalles are contracting to pay 15 cents a pound for cherries in the orchard. The price is attributed to the hard winter conditions of most of the United States which has materially reduced fruit crops.

Government purchase of liberty bonds in the open market will stop May 1, according to announcement of Secretary Houston. The secretary states that the purchase of liberty bonds and continued issue of national certificates of indebtedness had the effect of decreasing the bonded indebtedness but was fast increasing the floating indebtedness to an unsafe degree.

Senator W. D. Wood of Hillsboro is a candidate for secretary of state. Dr. Wood has been in the state senate something like twelve years and proved to be a power in holding down state expense. As a member of the State Board of Control that goes with secretaryship of state, Dr. Wood would be exceptionally qualified by his knowledge of state institutions gained on legislative investigations.

The Leap Year dance given in Moro opera house Friday evening by the Moro girls under the direction of Misses Grace Muir, Adeline Hockman, and Marie Provost was a social and financial success. From the inception of the dance until its successful close it was strictly a girls' affair, including selection of partners, securing the hall, music, etc., and the preparing and serving of lunch. About 53 numbers were sold.

Will H. Daly, federal fair-price commissioner of Oregon under appointment of Attorney General Palmer, has telegraphed his resignation to Washington and announced Saturday that he is through with the position for the reason that he has received no support. The national administration, he said, has failed him and he is too busy with his private business to devote valuable time to a task at which he can accomplish nothing.

A large delegation of local citizens called upon L. L. Peetz at his farm home west of Moro on Monday for the purpose of persuading him to accept the obligation of entering the primary election as candidate for the nomination for county commissioner. Altho Mr. Peetz appreciated the honor of the visit he did not consent to make the race. Members of the party then declared they would write in his name on the ballot, to which Mr. Peetz responded that under those conditions, if nominated, he would accept.

The Des Chutes Motor Co., R. S. Goff manager, has been appointed agent for a new Ford district comprising the county of Sherman and that part of Wasco county east of the Des Chutes river for Ford cars, trucks, and Fordson tractors. All Ford cars, trucks, and Fordson tractors and genuine Ford parts will be distributed in this territory from Moro and as far as practicable the same Ford service stations will be maintained as at present. Mr. Goff states that he expects to visit every part of the new district at once for the purpose of organizing a cooperative system between all parts of the district.

Saturday afternoon fire starting from an oil stove left burning without attendants came near destroying the Moro opera house. At the request of the young lady managers of the dance held the previous evening Manager L. W. Ross started the stove to heat water with which to wash the dishes used in serving the dance supper after which he left and so did the girls. The damage was confined to the check room immediately back of the office; supplies such as tickets, slides, etc., a small electric motor, an electric fan, the dishes waiting to be washed, and the oil stove that started the fire. Water damage was very slight to other parts of the building. The usual picture show was put on that evening, but repairs caused a postponement of the Tuesday evening show.

The Dalles Chapter of the American Red Cross is now equipped with a home service worker, Miss Elizabeth Tandy. The office at the old court house has been reopened. If you have not received your bonus or travel pay or there is still some allotment or allowance money due you she will help you secure that. All the information in regard to compensation, vocational training, insurance, etc., is at hand. The Dalles Chapter provides this service for all ex-service men and their families in the Chapter. This means all men in Wasco, Sherman, Wheeler, and Gilliam counties. It is the duty of the Red Cross to help all ex-service men adjust their affairs with the government. The Red Cross is making every effort to fulfill this responsibility. A letter sent through the Red Cross may bring the result you have been working for a long time.

Sherman county has experienced a genuine famine in gasoline the past ten days, none being available at any selling station in the county. When the shortage first loomed it was not considered serious, except by one man at Grass Valley who was reported to have bought a thousand gallons. Saturday at The Dalles all tanks were empty and a number of cars stalled. There were 100 cars of gasoline on the side tracks at Portland but because of the switchmen's strike no way was open to secure shipment. Monday the famine in Sherman county was relieved by a car received at Wasco.

The State University Agricultural College and the State Normal

have for many years spent less money per student per year in training Oregon boys and girls than is spent at any other state institution. The present cost at the State University is \$203 a year; at the College, it is \$180. But even before the war, when money would buy twice as much as it buys now, the average cost at all other state institutions was \$325 a year. In addition

At the State University it is at present \$322 per student; at the College, \$300. But in state institutions elsewhere, statistics show the average to be \$995. These are convincing proofs of economical administration, but the three institutions can no longer give satisfactory training to the vast numbers of Oregon boys and girls (5400 in full time courses alone), unless they receive more support. On May 21 the Higher Educational relief measure will appear on the ballot. You are urged to preserve the quality of higher education by voting for it.
