## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week  
Briefly Sketched for Infor-  
mation of Our Readers.

David M. Smutz, aged 75 years,  
veteran of the Civil war, died in Dallas.  
The week of March 22 to 27 will be  
pure-bred livestock week in Lane  
county.

George Taylor Cotton, a merchant of  
Lebanon for 40 years, died at the age  
of 73 years.  
Secretary Houston has approved ap-  
plication for a charter of the First  
National bank of Madras.

The Dalles now boasts one of the  
finest and most up-to-date apartment  
houses in the Inland Empire.

Directors of the Lane County Fair  
association announce the building of a  
goat and sheep building 30 by 200 feet.

The 1920 consistory class of Eugene,  
Scottish Rite Masons, elected Judge  
John S. Coke of Marshfield, pres. dent

One-fourth of the \$100,000 necessary  
for construction of the new Salem hos-  
pital has been pledged by physicians  
of Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties.

The American Jersey Cattle club has  
withdrawn its support from the state  
fair, transferring it wholly to the In-  
ternational Livestock show at Port-  
land.

The Medford Elks lodge has grown  
so rapidly the past year that at the  
last meeting it was decided to put up  
a \$7000 extension to its building at  
once.

The White Cooking club of Hub-  
bard in Marion county is the first  
club in the state to have 100 per cent  
of its members finish the required  
work.

Prohibition has not increased the  
use of drugs in Oregon, declare nar-  
cotics operatives working for the  
United States internal revenue depart-  
ment.

E. D. Cusick, former state senator  
from Linn and Lane counties, was  
elected exalted ruler of the Albany  
lodge of Elks in the annual election of  
officers.

The animal husbandry department of  
O. A. C. has received a shipment of  
10 head of pure bred Hampshire ewes,

purchased from I. T. Edwards of Kim-  
berly, Idaho.

At a meeting of the state advisory  
board of the Salvation Army home  
service programme for 1920, a con-  
vention was called to meet in Port-  
land March 17.

The University of Oregon won the  
championship of the International Tri-  
angular Debating league, composed of  
the Universities of Idaho, British  
Columbia and Oregon.

The register of the Roseburg land  
office has issued a statement that all  
exservice men will be given preference  
rights in filing on land known as the  
Oregon and California land grants.

Gold order certificates, payable to a  
given bank, held by that bank in its  
vaults not endorsed, are not legal re-  
serve, according to a legal opinion  
given by Attorney-General Brown.

Samuel Strohecker Jr. of Corvallis  
has been nominated by Representative  
Hawley as alternate to the military  
academy at West Point to succeed Del-  
mar L. Bond of Salem, who resigned.

Damage to forests in Oregon last  
year as the results of fires totaled  
about \$600,000, according to the an-  
nual report of F. A. Elliott, state for-  
ester.

Salem chapter, American War Mothers,  
at a meeting outlined plans for  
endowing a four-bed ward in the pro-  
posed new Salem hospital in honor  
of the returned veterans of the world  
war.

The herd law in effect in Umatilla  
county, which provides against live-  
stock running at large, is utterly un-  
constitutional, according to a legal  
opinion given by Attorney-General  
Brown.

The part time schools which have  
been in vogue in Wisconsin for the  
past eight years are a success and  
have done much toward furthering the  
educational advantages of that state,  
according to J. A. Churchill, state  
superintendent of public instruction,  
who returned to Salem after three  
weeks spent in the east and middle  
west.

Albany school teachers will receive  
a material increase in salaries for the  
next school year. Because of lack of  
funds the school board has been un-  
able to meet requests for a big raise  
this year, but a budget \$11,500 greater  
is available for next year's work and  
the board has decided to use all of  
this increase for the payment of larger  
salaries.

Plans are under way for a reorgan-  
ized merchants' association at Hood  
River.

Pendleton will hold its third annual  
automobile show on March 11, 12  
and 13.

The Dalles city physician reports  
that smallpox is showing a tendency  
to increase.

The 1919 tax roll for Clatsop county  
totals \$1,618,782.66, the largest in the  
history of the county.

Within 90 days a company will begin  
drilling for oil in Clatsop county, ac-  
cording to F. H. Kiff, an oil expert  
of Oklahoma.

Douglas county holds the record so  
far for the number of dogs licensed by  
the county, 1100 dogs bearing the coun-  
ty license tags.

A new wage scale advancing the  
minimum of \$4.80 hitherto paid to \$5  
a day, was announced by the saw mill  
owners of Bend.

George A. Briscoe, who has been su-  
perintendent of the Ashland schools  
for nine years, has been reelected for  
a two-year term.

Roseburg will be a stopping place for  
aircraft which it is alleged will soon  
be plying between San Francisco, Port-  
land and Seattle.

The Ashland Canning company closed  
a most successful season with a  
total pack exceeding that of any pre-  
vious year and valued at \$38,500.

County Agent Scott of Clackamas  
county announces that the last carload  
of eggs shipped to the New York mar-  
ket netted the producers 55 cents.

All high schools in Southern Oregon,  
except Eugene and Roseburg, have  
withdrawn from the Oregon State De-  
bating league because of the preva-  
lence of influenza.

Burglars entered the hardware store  
of Wardle & Campbell at Carlton and  
secured about \$145 worth of pocket  
knives and razors. Eight dollars was  
taken from the till.

A contract has been signed at Salem  
whereby Henry L. Bents of Aurora will  
sell his entire crop of hops for the year  
1920 to an English firm at a stipulated  
price of 37 cents a pound.

In the biggest day's catch of the  
past year, 104 offending motorists  
were arrested by Portland police one  
day last week on various charges of  
violating the traffic laws.

The Baldwin & Swope Construction  
company, recently organized at Hood  
River, has been awarded the contract  
for building a new schoolhouse at  
Mosier to be 90 by 70 feet.

Mrs. Earl Stitt, who was burned  
while starting a fire in the kitchen  
range with oil waste, died at Lebanon.  
She was the English war bride of  
Earl Stitt, a young overseas service  
man.

The 1919 census of the Umatilla  
project, just published by the reclama-  
tion office, shows that the total value  
of the crops grown during the year is  
over \$600,000, averaging almost \$75  
per acre.

One hundred China pheasants from  
the Simpson pheasant farm at Spring-  
field were released on the 1000-acre  
Cartwright ranch adjoining Harris-  
burg, which has been made a state  
game reserve.

The city of Roseburg, through its at-  
torney, B. L. Eddy, filed with the Ore-  
gon public service commission its brief  
opposing the proposed increase in  
rates sought by the Douglas County  
Water & Light company.

Remonstrance against the paving of  
Railroad street was made at the  
meeting of the Albany city council by  
abutting property owners and may re-  
sult in the former decision to pave  
the street being rescinded.

The best Jersey bull that \$1000 will  
buy is to be purchased by a group of  
dairymen in the Alsea valley in west-  
ern Benton county. This action was  
taken at the close of a three-day ex-  
tension school held in Alsea.

Five more alleged members of the  
I. W. W. were indicted under the  
criminal syndicalism act in the final  
report of the Multnomah county Feb-  
ruary grand jury, returned to Presid-  
ing Judge McCourt Saturday.

State Treasurer Hoff has increased  
the appraisement of the estate of C.  
O. Bigelow, who died a few months  
ago in Josephine county, from \$30,713  
to \$40,713. Inheritance tax on the  
estate as now appraised will total  
\$475.

From an assessed valuation of \$28-  
554,209 in 1900 to \$312,571,785 in 1919  
is the record sheet for Multnomah  
county for 1920, based upon the 1919  
assessment and tax roll, and issued  
by Henry E. Reed, assessor.

Senator Chamberlain, Senator Mc-  
Nary and Representative McArthur  
have telegraphed the Albany post of  
the American Legion that they are  
in favor of the proposed bonus bill for  
ex-service men or similar legislation  
in the interest of the former soldiers.

The Marion county court went on  
record favoring an appropriation of  
\$10,000 to aid in construction of a  
community house for the American  
Legion, as authorized by the last leg-  
islature.

Boys and girls between the ages of  
16 and 18, who are employed and who  
have not finished the eighth grade,  
must attend part-time school in Ore-  
gon City, according to an order issued  
by the school board.

Marion county through the county  
court, has offered to contribute \$25-  
000 to the construction of the pro-  
posed new Salem hospital on condi-  
tion that the remainder of the neces-  
sary \$100,000 is made available.

The inventory and appraisement of  
the estate of Dr. Bernard Daly of Lake-  
view, who died recently, shows a total  
value of \$733,628.57, more than \$500-  
000 of which is in government, munic-  
ipal, school, county and road bonds.

By a vote of 217 to 30 the city of  
Seaside has bonded itself for \$263,000  
for the construction of a pier into the  
Pacific ocean, a system of bulkheads  
on the ocean front and a new hard-  
surface driveway through the entire  
city.

The recent threat of labor to petition  
state officials to oust from their em-  
ployment all married women whose  
husbands are capable of providing for  
their support, appears to have stimu-  
lated rather than deterred marriages  
of girls on the state payroll.

The students of Baker high school  
have purchased a new, high-class mo-  
tion-picture machine and have booked  
a long series of excellent film pro-  
ductions, which will be projected upon  
the screen in the high school audi-  
torium one evening in every week.

Robbers broke into the vault of the  
Seio State bank at Seio and escaped  
with an unknown quantity of Liberty  
bonds, War Savings Stamps and some  
cash secured from rifling the contents  
of boxes, which may total as high as  
\$50,000. No attempt was made to open  
the main safe.

A questionnaire is being sent to all  
the high school principals in the state  
by Dr. John Landsbury, dean of the  
school of music of the State University,  
in an attempt to gain their coopera-  
tion in making high school credits in  
music worthy of being rated as uni-  
versity entrance credits.

With national leaders present, and  
a great majority of the Baptist  
minister of the state in attendance,  
Baptist leaders met at the White  
Temple in Portland to formulate plans  
for the nation-wide campaign for \$100-  
000,000. Oregon's apportionment of  
this fund will be \$1,450,000, it was  
announced.

Because Oregon and California face  
an "unprecedented shortage of water  
for either hydroelectric power or ir-  
rigation purposes," the Geary Invest-  
ment corporation of Oregon, and the  
California-Oregon Power company, a  
California corporation, will bury the  
hatchet this year and allow water stor-  
age in the Upper Klamath lake.

Approximately 400 acres of worthless  
swamp land in Douglas county will be  
made worth between \$300 and \$400 per  
acre by the new drainage project  
outlined by Professor C. F. Johnson,  
drainage expert of the Oregon Agri-  
cultural college, and County Agent C.  
J. Hurd. The lands are situated in the  
Looking Glass and Yoncalla valleys.

According to reports announced by  
the city health bureau there are 11  
cases of sleeping sickness in Portland  
at present. Deaths from the disease  
to date total eight, of which six were  
reported in December, one in January  
and one in February. Sleeping sick-  
ness is comparatively new here, and  
no record of cases was kept prior to  
last December.

Receipts of the automobile depart-  
ment for February, 1920, as shown by  
a report issued by the secretary of  
state were \$200,856, as against \$38-  
796.50 for the same month in 1919.  
The large increase is due, according  
to Sam A. Koser, in charge of the  
motor vehicle department; to the new  
law, which increased the license fees  
for all classes of motor vehicles.

Eight democrats and five republicans  
have filed formal declaration of their  
candidacy for delegates to their res-  
pective party conventions. Fully a  
score of republicans have been men-  
tioned as possible candidates or have  
expressed a desire to be delegates, but  
they have not taken the trouble to  
file with the secretary of state. Half  
a dozen democrats are preparing to  
file.

Under the market road act there  
will be available about \$2,000,000 dur-  
ing this and succeeding years for the  
development of strictly market roads  
in the various counties. Through the  
action of this law the state will eventu-  
ally be webbed to the most remote  
sections by feeder roads. The law  
was enacted in 1919, with some amend-  
ments at the special session in 1920,  
and it will be placed in operation this  
year. Because of the importance of  
laying a suitable groundwork for future  
development of the market road sys-  
tem, the state highway commission  
has for months been working out a  
policy for applying the enactment.
