Market Road Meeting

About 40 interested persons attended the road meeting in Moro last Thursday night to discuss the proposed location of the Market Road leading out past Lone Rock. The survey cuts through the barn yard of the Experiment Station to avoid a 12-foot cut in front of the station on the present road location. The meeting was opposed to the change of route and on motion a committee was appointed consisting of A. M. Wright, D. E. Stephens and A. H. Barnum to confer with the engineer and highway commission to try and leave the present grade and location as it is. The county engineer stated at the meeting that for little expense there could be made a drive way under the new route by which wagons, automobiles and stock could pass from one part of the farm to the other.

Statement to the Public

It has come to my attention that political stories are being circulated in Sherman county to the effect that I have used my position as County Commissioner as a means to assist my private business in the matter of sales of materials to Sherman county.

I can positively state that this is not the fact in any particular. I have never tried to influence any county employee to buy any thing from either myself or the firm with which I am identified. In addition to this I have always considered the office of County Commissioner as a trust imposed upon me by the people of this county and have consistently used my position as a merchant to enable the county to profit in any transaction where possible.

More than a year ago March, 1919, five gravel dump wagons were purchased by the county in Portland. Ordinarily such a transaction allows the local agent a commission. In this case a commission or profit of \$40 each was allowed Ginn, Coleman & Co. I have a cancelled check dated April 2d, 1919, indicating the fact that this county was given the profit earned on the transaction.

Two similar transactions were completed under date of May 23d, 1919, and November 23d, 1919, as vouched for by receipts issued by G. B. Bourhill as county treasurer. These were for road machinery and at no time could the county have bought these for less money than was paid. The commissions earned are legitimate ordinary business profits allowed by wholesale firms, but never retained by myself or my business associates.

In addition to the above it is a standing order of the present county court that where work is being done that locality shall supply whatever may be needed, conditions being equal, when possible to obtain it at that place. Under this order Kent, Grass Valley, Moro and Wasco share equal in county business, according to work done, the same to be purchased wherever the county engineer can buy to best advantage.

I have always considered my position as County Commissioner a public trust and if re-nominated and elected will give the office the best business administration that I can.
