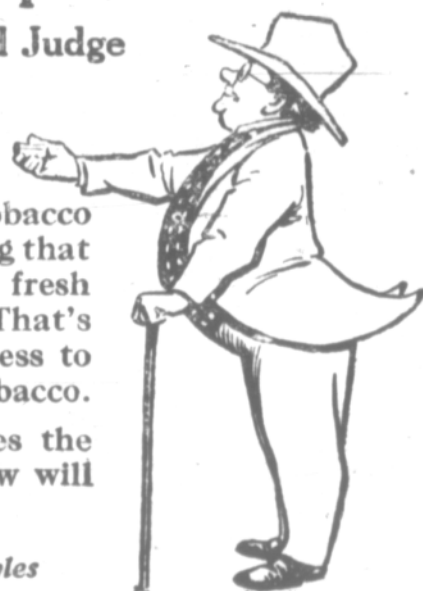

State Chamber of Commerce

Announcement of a state wide campaign that will be conducted by the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce and the part that Moro is to play in the movement was outlined last week by P. E. Magruder, representing the State Chamber, who visited Moro in connection with a survey of the state now in progress that will precede the intensive organization work.

The campaign, its purposes and aims, was discussed at length by Mr. Magruder with a number of local citizens including R. J. Ginn, F. E. Fortner, W. C. Bryant, C. C. Calkins, W. H. Ragsdale and J. C. McKean, all of whom are interested in the plans of the state chamber.

R. J. Ginn was selected and accepted the chairmanship of the Moro Executive Committee which will cooperate with other cities in the state wide movement. Associated with him will be F. E. Fortner, W. H. Ragsdale, K. A. McPherson and J. C. McKean.

The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has undertaken to play a big part in the future development of the state. Funds will be raised to carry on an extensive program of activities. Among these will be an advertising campaign to set forth the opportunities to be found in Oregon and to encourage land settlement; administration to promote irrigation; extension of railroads; refund on reclamation fund; extension of highways, both for commercial purposes and through national forests; cooperation with agricultural and lumbering interests and numerous other projects, the development of which will be of incalculable value to the state.

Mr. Magruder was assured by local leaders with whom he talked that Moro could be relied upon to do her share with other communities of Oregon. Other representatives of the State Chamber of Commerce will visit Moro later and complete the organization work for the state wide movement which, it is declared, will benefit every section of Oregon.

### The Secret of Keeping Young

There is no decrepitude, no aging, no declining of powers in the ideal, says New Success. There are no wrinkles, no creaking joints, no hardening of the arteries or brain tissues in the youthful ideal, and if we live in this ideal the boy or girl in us will not die, and it is death of the boy or girl in us that brings on age. As long as we keep the youthful spirit, as long as the heart is young and fresh and joyous, as long as we impress the youthful thought on our cells we do not age, no matter what our years may count.

### When Soap Was Useless Luxury

The American doctor who warns us not to wash would at one time have found many sympathizers among ladies of the aristocracy, says Manchester Guardian. When Augustus Hare was visiting Lady Waterford at Highcliffe, in 1873, he heard one of the other guests, Mrs. Fairholme, remark: "My grandmother used to say that beauty went out with open carriages. 'Why, you are just like me, my dear,' she told me, 'with your brown pecks and your rough skins and your red noses. In our days it was different; young ladies never walked, ate nothing but white meat and never washed their faces. They covered their faces with powder, then put cold cream on, and wiped it off with a flannel. That was the way to have a good complexion.'" We know also from contemporary memoirs that two French kings, Henry III and Louis XIV, were consistent antiablu-tionists. The grand monarch used cold cream in place of soap and water. Henry III not only shunned water, but lay all night with raw veal chops on his cheeks, with his hands tied by silk cords to the top of the bed, so as to preserve their whiteness. And Sir Anthony Weldon says of James I: "His skin was soft as taffeta sarsnet, which felt so because he never washed his hands, only rubb'd his finger ends slightly with the wet end of a napkin."

### Debt of Small Nations

Some time ago an interesting discussion took place in the London press as to the debt which the world owed to the small nation. It was shown how some of the world's greatest leaders and teachers had sprung from peoples that had no pretensions to power, and how the small nation was often able to take the lead in working out some great social scheme or form of government, the development of which would have been difficult amidst great masses of people. In these latter days, this seems to have been especially the case with Canada. For although, territorially speaking, Canada is one of the greatest of nations, in point of population she is still one of the least. And Canada has certainly taken the lead, recently, in many questions of first importance, says Christian Science Monitor. It cannot be recalled too often that, at the greatest crisis of the war, she led the world in proclaiming national prohibition, and that she followed this up by instituting woman suffrage, and laying down the great democratic law that everyone who enjoys the protection of the state should take his share, according to his ability, in its labors. And now Canada bids fair to give the lead in the solving of another great problem, the great problem of the hour, namely, the labor problem.

Although action on the matter has been, to a certain extent, delayed by the war, there can be no doubt that there has come over public opinion during the last five years a very great change on the question of prisons and prisoners, says Christian Science Monitor. With the pitiful results of "envy, hatred and malice, and all uncharitableness" spread out before it, the world, or at any rate a large part of it, has taken very rapid strides toward that vantage point whence it can be clearly seen that such passions have never built and can never build anything or safeguard anything. And so the two great societies in Great Britain which devote themselves to reform of the prison system are preparing to renew their labors with vigor.

In refusing to naturalize a foreigner Chief Justice McCoy of the district supreme court, did what will be generally approved, says National Tribune. He said in that the present condition of the country's unrest we could not be too careful in admitting foreigners to citizenship, and he would not admit any that did not have a fair working knowledge of our form of government and the duties of citizenship. American citizenship should be highly prized and not be bestowed without careful consideration.

### Education is Worthy the Effort

The desire of every youth is a successful business or professional life. About the age of entering high school he gets the working bee. He feels strong and fit for any task. With pinions untried in the wintering, singing, scathing blasts of business competition the youthful hero wants to compete with everybody and everything. He would launch at once into his life work, often without knowing just what he wants to do. He forgets that he needs the training of years to fit him for the world's work. He never thinks of what a few years of school will add to this fitness later on. The boy with a high school education will earn at least \$18,000 to \$20,000 more than will the fellow who hasn't a high school training. And the college-trained man is in proportion greater. Don't be beguiled into thinking that the present mad rush of industrial prices is going on forever. The years of training in brain use are only the detour to lasting progress.

Not long ago aid was urged for the Armenians, on whom the Turks were threatening a massacre. Now news comes that the Turks are begging the Americans to save them from being massacred by the Armenians. The Turks may naturally fear extermination they had planned for their old-time victims, but all the rest of the world will admit that the loss of the Turks will be a distinct gain to human society at large.
