Samuel Herrick, an attorney at
Washington, D.C., is entitled to col-
lect a fee for lobbying in congress in
behalf of Charles Barzee and other
Sherman county settlers according to
an opinion written by Justice Bean
and handed down by the Oregon
supreme court May 25th. Justice Ben-
nett wrote a dissenting opinion. The
case was tried before Judge W. N.
Gatens of the Multnomah county cir-
cuit court, and upon motion of the de-
fense was thrown out on a technical-
ity. Justice Bean, in reversing the
verdict of Judge Gatens, held that
Herrick had performed his part of the
contract and was entitled to collect
his fee.
