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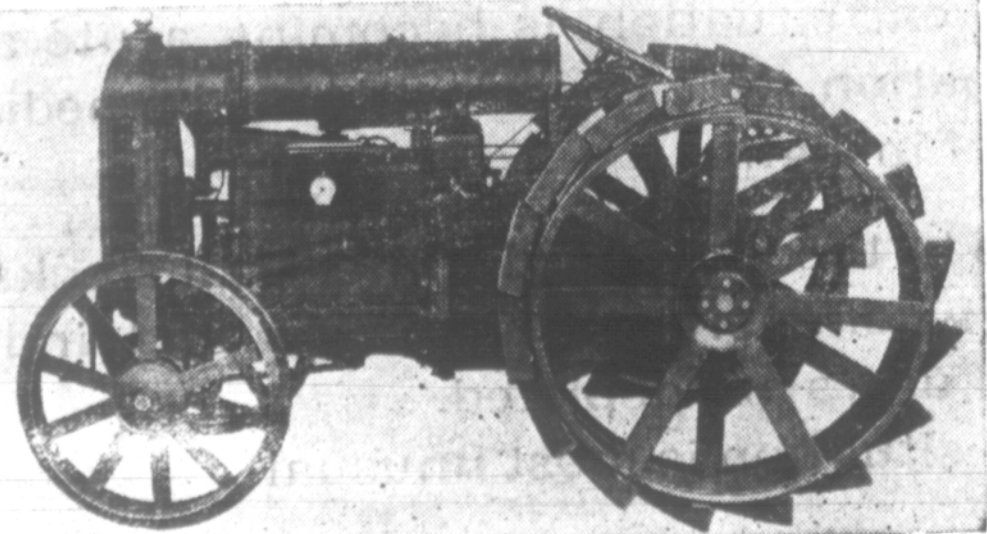

Statue Sherman County Boy Unveiled

John D. Gilbert, member of the School of Journalism at the Oregon University, Eugene, writes the Observer as follows: The face and figure of one Sherman county young man, that of Dow Wilson of Rufus, will stand forever on the campus of the University of Oregon when "The New Earth", a statue modelled by Roswell Dorsch before his death is unveiled in his memory June 17th by his friends on the faculty of the University. Mr. Wilson served as model for the figure which the sculptor finished a few days before he entered the army, where he died. Mr. Dorsch chose Wilson as the subject for his study of the earth emerging from the purging of war because of the young man's splendid physique, developed playing "end" on the football team and as an all-around athlete on the track.

### Will Address DeMoss Chautauqua

The annual Chautauqua at DeMoss is putting Sherman county on the map as regards stellar attractions during Chautauqua week, the Fourth of July, and the Pioneers' Reunion Day. First in order is that the celebrated evangelistic speaker "Billy" Sunday will address the people at DeMoss Park on Sunday morning, July 4th. Next in importance is the announcement that the nationally famous personage, William Jennings Bryan, will be the principal speaker on Tuesday evening, July 6th. It is seldom that any community is able to secure two such notable men in the one week and without exacting any further financial charge from their auditors.

### Farmers' Grain Grading School

The grain grades are still in effect. The farmers who are spending 362 days raising wheat should be able to spend at least three days learning how better to be able to market the crop. Remember that the other fellow is putting in all his time on the marketing end and you must be able to cope with him. Plan to attend the 3-day grain grading school put on at the Grass Valley elevator Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, June 21, 22, and 23. Bring a 2-quart sample of your wheat along. This school will be in charge of Prof. G. R. Hyslop of Corvallis whom most of the farmers in Oregon know. Mr. Hyslop will be assisted by the state department. Tuesday afternoon will be given over to some regulatory work put on by the office of markets. Three days spent here will mean money in your pockets. You will learn how to determine dockage, how test weights are made, how to use the grain grades, and hear talks and take part in discussions of subjects relating to the farmers' interests in grain grades. The sessions will start at 10 a. m. each morning.

### City Council Orders Improvements

The city council has authorized a series of improvements that include a cement cross walk in the alley between the J. R. Morgan and Wm. Morrison properties; a cement crossing between the Hulury garage and the pump house and to continue past the city property to connect with the Ginn, Coleman & Co. walk, and from there, if arrangements can be made with the railroad, to continue across the tracks; a cement crossing between the Ramsey and Powell properties on Scott street and also, probably, between the Ramsey and Peetz properties at the same intersection; cement crossing between the Sayers and Ginn properties on McCoy street. In addition to the above three wooden crossings have been built at First and Scott streets between the L. V. Moore corner and Dr. Morgan, between the L. V. Moore corner and Dr. Poley, and between the last named and the E. H. Moore corner. These wooden crossings have been built pending establishing the street grade at that intersection.

### Kent Crop Prospects Best Ever

Earl Gregg, from Kent, was an Observer visitor Wednesday afternoon. He said that the Kent section was visited Sunday and Monday with a generous rain over all that portion of the county, resulting in a crop prospect that at the present time is the best prospect since 1912. Mr. Gregg also said that all the grain in that section was looking fine, especially several fields of Turkey Red, being tried for the first time this season. Mr. Gregg has 120 acres of Turkey Red, W. H. Helyer a section, and Luther Davis 120 acres, all doing fine. In conclusion, Mr. Gregg said that the best spring grain he has ever seen in Sherman county is that on the Luther Davis place, just south of Kent.

### Local Auto Tourists Return

Truman Strong and wife returned on the 15th from a three weeks auto trip down the Columbia and Pacific highways as far south as Cottage Grove where they visited with Mrs. Srong's parents. On their return they visited at the home of Mr. Strong's parents at Eugene and with G. W. Brock and family at Lebanon. They found the majority of the roads in fine shape, with the exception of the Pacific highway in rather long spots, but recommend what is known as the "river road" south from Salem. Their main trouble was gas for their car, but on the going trip secured a full tank at Portland which was all they could secure until Eugene was reached. Coming back they loaded up with a full gas supply at Eugene, four gallons at Portland, two gallons at Hood River.

### Farmers' Day at the Station

Don't forget that on Thursday June 24th the farmers of the county are all invited to visit the Experiment Station. The group will meet at the pavillion at the Fair Grounds at 1:30 p. m. for a half hour where Mr. Stephens will be better able to show on charts, etc., the results of the different methods of farming after which all will make a tour of the station where these results can be read in terms of standing grain. Don't forget the date. It comes the day after the grain grading school closes at Grass Valley.

The rain so much needed to carry the wheat crop of Sherman county to successful maturity visited this county at different times this month.
