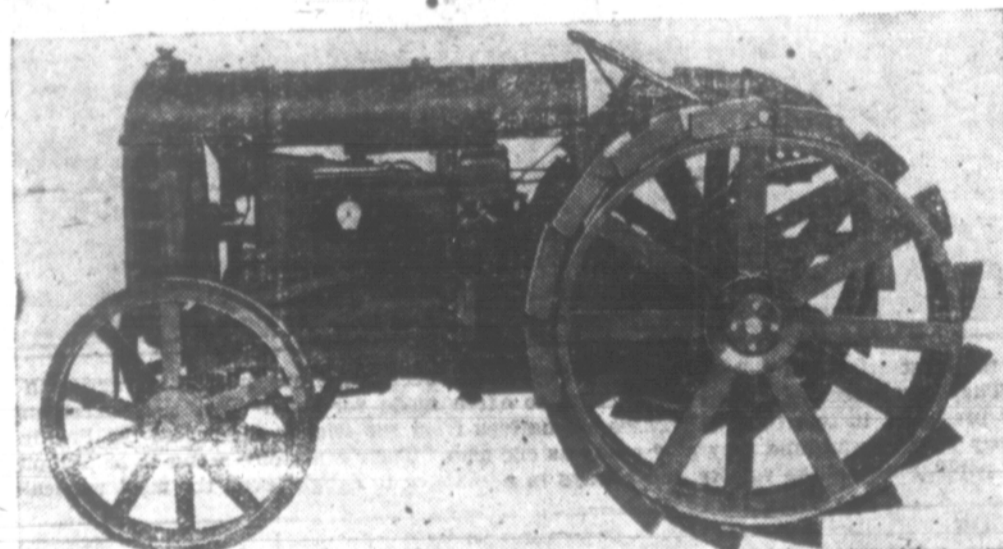

Get Your Auto Driver's License

Have you applied for your driver's license yet, to operate your car over the highway?

The new law in part reads as follows: No person shall operate or drive a motor vehicle upon any highway in this state until and unless such person shall have issued to him an operator's license by the secretary of state.

No such operator's license shall be issued to any person less than 16 years of age and who has not had at least five days experience in the operation and driving of motor vehicles.

No person who is the owner or custodian of any motor vehicle, shall permit any person who is less than 16 years of age to operate or drive any such motor vehicle or employ any person to operate or drive any such motor vehicle who is less than 18 years of age and a licensed operator or chauffeur.

Any person violating any provision of the law is liable to a fine not exceeding \$400 or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both.

The new law will help make the roads and highways of the state more safe for the majority of the public who use them. Also, in case of accident any person who allows an unlicensed member of the family to drive the car will not be able to make a defense in court. This is not always understood, but is worth remembering.

Learning From The Marines

The British have learned much from the inventiveness of our marines in Haiti. It will be remembered that the marines found that it was vastly saving of shoe leather and God's patience to not follow on foot after the bands of robbers. The ingenious "leather necks" are equal to every occasion and every clime, and have devised a much better way, says National Tribune. They took possession of old iron pipes, filled them with a high explosive to which was attached a fuse, and then dropped these directly into the robber nest from airplanes. The quieting effect upon the robbers was magical. Their hidden strongholds in the mountains were no longer impregnable and no marine had to sacrifice his life by being ambushed in the narrow passes. The British have for years had trouble with the Afghanistan tribes who have raided the more peaceful lowlands. Of late these have been very annoying to the British trains. The British have now started all-planes flying over the retreats of the banditti, dropping bombs upon them.

That the work of the conservation commission in encouraging planting of forest-trees on farm woodlots, estates and idle waste land in Wisconsin is progressing favorably, is evidenced by the fact that during the last five years approximately 800,000 trees have been planted by citizens of this state, says Milwaukee Sentinel. This work takes on an added significance this year. The campaign to make Wisconsin increasingly beautiful, initiated by passage of the rural planning law in 1919 and the subsequent organization of rural planning committees in the counties draws attention to the fact that tree planting and tree conservation along highways, lake frontages and water courses is of first importance.
