Walter Blau, who had the misfortune to lose his big toe off his left foot by being caught in a combine chain last week, is recovering nicely at The Dalles hospital. He was taken to the hospital by Dr. Ghormley for fear that blood poisoning might result.

W. H. Hill was in town Wednesday from his farm in the Gorman district and reports that his 500 acre crop will average close to nine or ten sack to the acre. From 32 acres he has threshed 435 sacks, an average of 13 1/2 sacks per acre. This is from land that in former hands was not considered capable of producing more than three sacks to the acre.

A young stranger, hired to drive wheat team for J. T. Henkle, farming in Hay Canyon district, is credited with setting a stubble fire on Monday that burned over about nine acres of ground and about 40 sacks of wheat. It is supposed to have started from either a cigarette stub or a discarded match. Being near the house it was soon under control, a plow running circles around the fire helped materially in holding it from spreading.

The hot exhaust from a caterpillar tractor set fire to the stubble in the W. B. Rice field Monday morning, burning over about 75 acres of ground of the 100 acres threshed and in which was 1440 sacks of grain in dumps from the combine. The fire caught in a corner turn on a straw dump as the outfit was making their first day. The crew saw the flash, but not soon enough to stop the fire, which cleaned the stubble and burned the sacks off the threshed grain, leaving small heaps of surface charred grain. The burned over area has been estimated to be approximately half a mile long and 250 feet wide. Ben Hicks, brother to Bert Hicks, hurt last week at the McLachlan place, and Whitney Starling were both overcome by the heat and smoke; Starling very seriously; the smoke having the same effect as the gas used in the war in Europe.

IN MEMORIUM

After many months of suffering from organic heart trouble Pearl Emaline Newton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Pinkerton and wife to W. E. Newton, died at The Dalles hospital at 8 p. m. Sunday, July 25th. Mrs. Newton was born in Page county, Iowa, March 19th, 1884; came to Oregon with her parents in March, 1886; was married to Mr. Newton December 27th, 1905; she united with the Moro Presbyterian church at an early age and lived a good consistent life as daughter, sister, wife, and mother. She leaves her parents; husband; a son, Elmer; two sisters, Mrs. C. E. Poole of Spokane and Mrs. M. R. Eoff of Yakima; a brother, Harry B., of Moro, and many relatives and friends to mourn their loss. Funeral services were held from the Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon, Rev. E. E. McVicker preaching the sermon. Interment was in the family plot in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

John W. Messinger, pioneer settler of Oregon and Sherman county, died at his home in McMinnville Monday noon, July 26th, from a hardening of the arteries. Mr. Messinger was born April 2d, 1846, in Iowa, crossing the plains at an early age to Oregon where he married Brizillia Olds at Carlton on September 11th, 1867. To this union eight children were born, of whom seven are living. After the death of Mrs. Messinger, about five years ago, he married Sadie Swann of McMinnville who survives him. Funeral services were held Wednesday at McMinnville.
