K. A. McPherson, assistant cashier of the Bank of Moro, died at the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland Thursday noon following an operation early in the week for cancer of the intestines. Very few of his many friends knew of his sickness and fewer that he had gone to the hospital. "Kennie" McPherson, as he was more popularly addressed, was known by nearly all residents of Sherman county; in the early days he was one of the noted base ball stars of the local teams, playing with Wasco; later he was employed in the Irby store at Kent; then county clerk, and last assistant cashier of the Bank of Moro. Funeral service will be held at Wasco at three o'clock Sunday afternoon.

News was received in Moro Thursday of the sudden death of L. K. Moore on August 31st at his home in Portland, following an illness at the office at which time he called his home by phone and said he was coming home and to have a doctor there when he arrived, but death occurred before the doctor made his visit. Mr. Moore was for many years actively interested in Sherman county affairs, being engaged in the general mercantile business at Grass Valley and later at Moro. In early life he was a carpenter and many buildings in Sherman county in the pioneer days were constructed under his supervision.

Sheriff Crisman was called to Grass Valley Saturday to take charge of a supposed crazy man, but investigation showed that the man could neither read nor write and was totally deaf except for loud shouting in his left ear. He had good clothes, bedding, etc., and was brought to Moro where he was given meals and a ticket to Cascade Locks where he could get work in a saw mill.

## I. O. O. F. Cemetery Improvements

A. M. Young on the 26th finished the work of laying pipe for the new water service from the city system to the I. O. O. F. cemetery. As carried out by Mr. Young each lot and block in the I. O. O. F. cemetery and a good part of the Baptist cemetery joining can now be assured a plentiful water supply for the growing of plants and shrubbery through a series of lateral pipes branching off at 50-foot intervals from the main line going through the cemetery. Each of these lateral pipes are feeders for lines radiating each way, so that every lot in the cemetery now has access to water.

It would now be in order for owners of cemetery property to meet with I. O. O. F. lodge officials and arrange for a fund that would provide a reasonable amount to be expended in beautifying the grounds and paying for the services of a care taker and, when this is done, to promulgate rules and regulations for the future upkeep and maintenance of grounds and the elimination of many unsightly piles of rubbish left when ever monuments or other work is done on the grounds.

Eleven Sherman county schools will begin the fall term within the next ten days. Schools beginning September 6th are Grass Valley, Boardman, Erskine, Harmony, Gorman, and Brook. Kent school will start on the 7th. On the 13th Moro, DeMoss, Lickskillet, and Fairview will begin.

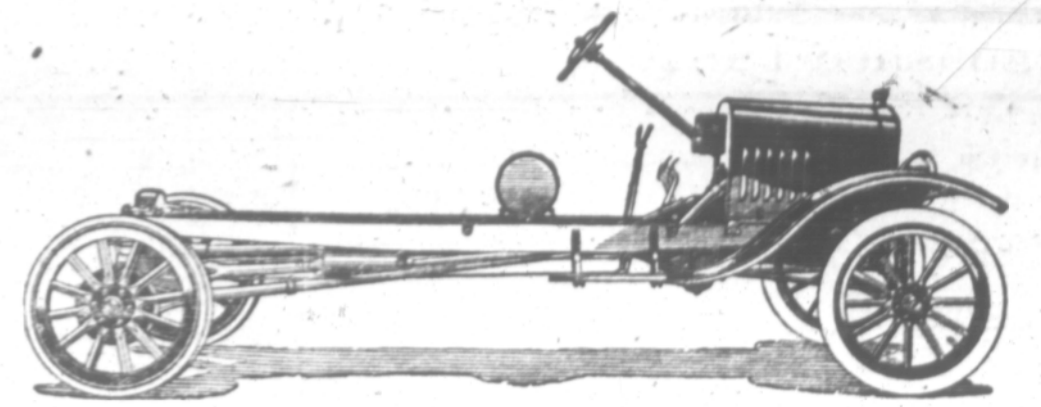
