20 DEAD RESULT OF RIOTING IN BELFAST

Belfast.—Nine persons are dead as a result of Monday's rioting in this city. Since the rioting began last week, twenty have been killed.

There were ominous signs of further trouble. Never in the history of Belfast were there such disorders as prevailed Monday. Mobs fought with wild fury, women mixing with the men in the melees. Girl workers fought like wildcats in one place, parties attacking each other. Unionist women charged on a number of Nationalist girls in Cork street, while the Nationalists made an attack on Unionists in the Falls road district.

A feature of the rioting was the extent of the destruction of property by incendiaryism. The fire brigade had an especially hard time during the night in fighting the flames. Their work was rendered hideous by the constant rattle of machine guns. The Sinn Feiners were in strong force and appeared to be well supplied with arms and ammunition.

The greatest of bitterness was displayed during the fighting. There was a great amount of wrecking of houses and the burning of furniture indoors and in the street.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Census figures give the population of Boise, Idaho, 21,393; increase, 4035, or 23.2 per cent.

Total Russian losses on the Polish front from all causes to date are 187,000, according to an official Polish communique issued.

Gordon Woodbury, formerly a member of the New Hampshire legislature, has been appointed assistant secretary of the navy to succeed Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The republican campaign book, entitled "Republicanism of 1920," is ready for distribution, it was announced by its editor, Frank Hendrick, a New York lawyer.

The Denver & Rio Grande railroad announced that 600 passengers were marooned at Salda, Col., where seven miles of track and bridges were torn up by storms.

Irish women pickets started a demonstration in New York that resulted in a walkout of more than 2000 longshoremen employed on British ocean liners as a protest against Great Britain's Irish policy.

Marshall Field Co. Must Show Profits. Chicago.—Federal investigation of alleged profiteering by big State St. department stores was renewed here when it was learned that the federal grand jury issued a subpoena ordering Marshall Field & Co., big department store, to produce its books.

PEACE CONFEREES TRANSFER TO RIGA

Russians Accept Polish Request to Shift Place of Meeting From Minsk.

Warsaw.—The Russian soviet government has accepted the Polish proposal for transfer of the Russo-Polish peace negotiations from Minsk to Riga. It was announced in a Moscow wireless message to the Polish government.

Reports reached Warsaw that little progress had been made at the Minsk conference and that it had been agreed to shift the negotiations in the hope of bettering conditions generally.

The Poles apparently are planning no advance beyond the ethnographic frontier as mentioned in the American note, to which the Poles have replied. The front rests roughly along the line laid down by the allies. There are indications that the Polish eastern line is being stabilized temporarily and the general staff has directed that there be no advance into districts where the Poles might not be welcomed.

The military authorities announced that the Poles were resting and regrouping after pushing the soviet forces beyond the Bug, where they are prepared to make a stand if attacked.

Polish artillery has decimated the principal column of retrograde soviet forces in the northeastern front, said an official statement. More than 600 men, including two general staff officers and 11 line officers, have been captured. Among the killed was the commander of the 57th bolshevik division and his chief of staff.

CONFIRM DEATH OF CZAR AND FAMILY

London.—All possible doubts that former Emperor Nicholas of Russia and his family were assassinated in the basement of their prison house at Ekaterinburg on the night of July 16, 1918, seems to be dispelled by accounts of two independent investigators published here. One is printed by the London Times and was written by its former Petrograd correspondent, Robert Wilton. The other appears in the magazine "Nineteenth Century and After," and is from the pen of Captain Francis McCullagh of the British army. Both spent several weeks at Ekaterinburg and talked with natives and soldiers who witnessed the affair through the windows of the house. Both writers agreed on the important details of the story.

The victims, they say, numbered 11, being the former emperor, his wife, son and four daughters, Dr. Botkin and three servants. The assassination was arranged by Yurovski, jailer in charge of the deposed royal family and was carried out by 12 soldiers. The Times account says these were Letts, but Captain McCullagh declares they were Magyars, placed on duty instead of a Russian guard.

EX-SECRETARY WILSON DIES

Portfolio in Cabinet Held for Fifteen Years Under Three Presidents.

Traer, Ia.—James Wilson, former secretary of agriculture, died at his home here.

James Wilson was head of the department of agriculture for 15 years, during which he contributed largely to the phenomenal agricultural development of the United States. His long service in the cabinet constituted a record. Albert Gallatin, once secretary of the treasury, had previously held the record with service of nearly 13 years.

Mr. Wilson's service, however, was notable for the constructive work which it included, rather than for the remarkably long time which he held the portfolio, with complete acceptability under three presidents of diverse temperaments—McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

Arab Parliament Likely. London.—According to a Daily Mail, it has been decided to establish an Arab parliament in Mesopotamia and also an Arab cabinet with British advisers.
