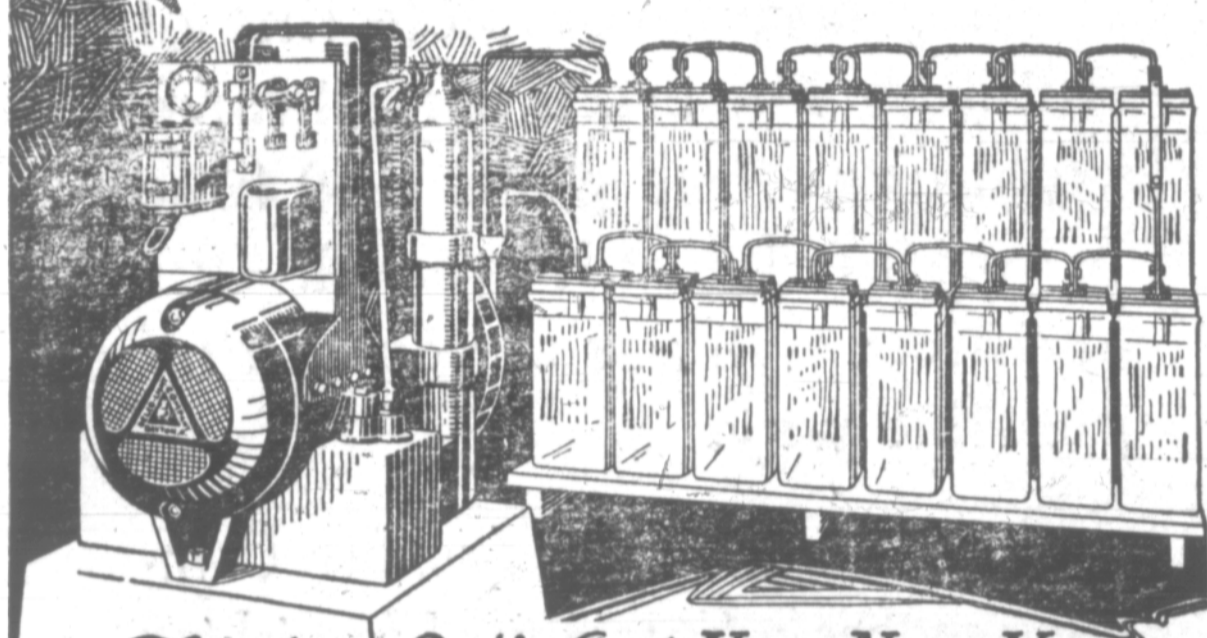

A new Junior, Ray Messenger, entered school Monday.

Moro took \$13.00 in prizes at the Sherman County School Children's Fair held last week in conjunction with the Annual County Fair. This is not as good a showing as has been made in other years, but we promise to do better next year. The local prize winners were Henry Barnum, first prize \$5, calf raising division II; Harold Roys, second prize \$2, mechanical contest division I; Harold Bryant, second prize \$2, mechanical contest division II; Henry Barnum, first prize \$3, mechanical contest division III. In the special contest Grass Valley took the \$10 prize for town schools in the booth contest and Erskine took the \$10 prize for rural schools. Wasco took the \$7.50 prize for the thrift contest for town schools and Rufus took the prize for rural schools.

The first assembly of the year was held in the Auditorium Tuesday morning, October 19th. Mr. Fagan gave the reports of the Sherman County Children's Fair and gave out the prizes awarded to Moro children.

A boys' athletic meeting was called on Tuesday afternoon, October 19th. It was decided not to play football this year, but to substitute volleyball. Chester Andersen was elected manager of the team and Willard Urquhart captain. Sides were selected to carry out the Physical Education Course, Willard Urquhart and Chester Andersen were appointed captains by Mr. Fagan.

The Juniors held a class meeting Tuesday morning and accepted an invitation to the Sophomore's Friday evening party. They are enjoying a secret as to the stunt they are going to pull.

The Sophomore class have invited the High School and Faculty to a party given in the Auditorium Friday, the 22d. Each class is to give a stunt to cover ten minutes each. The class with the best stunt will be rewarded with a prize. The party is to be given in honor of the Freshman class.

Moro Next Meeting Place

The L.O.O.F. annual district convention, which comprises Sherman, Wasco, and Hood River counties, was held at Antelope last Monday evening. About 20 members of the Moro Lodge were present and altogether there were about 200 Odd Fellows in attendance. This is said to be very good, considering the location of the convention and the distance from many of the lodges.

The lodge members are high in their praise of the reception they received from Antelope members and from the town as a whole. The convention next year will be held at Moro and not a dissenting vote was cast against the choice of this city. The convention also changed the date of the annual meeting from the 3d Monday in October to the 1st Monday.

At the annual election of officers Moro was honored by getting two of the chief places. Officers for the ensuing year are: A. M. Young, Moro Lodge, president; A. R. Kessinger, Moro Lodge, secretary; O. D. Doane, The Dalles Lodge, treasurer. The second degree was bestowed upon five new candidates by the Dufur team.

The Moro team left here about 5 p. m. and arrived in Antelope at 6:15. The roads were in fine condition. On the return it was stormy and about two inches of snow was encountered near Shaniko that made traveling slow until Kent was left behind. As they got nearer home it changed to rain and the roads became very slippery and muddy in places.

Only one small accident was reported and this was more of a comedy with a Dufur car as the chief star. This car was on its way to Antelope; it was too dark for the driver to see very well; when he came to a small bridge, he missed it; the car fell into a ditch and turned over upon a barbed wire fence; one man got his arm scratched; another occupant received a few minor scratches on his face; the third had to buy a new pair of pants. The car was righted and after an examination it was found to be undamaged and it proceeded on its way.
