The association gave a percentage of Saturdays gate receipts for Saturdays auto race. The exhibits were better than previous years and cost the association well over \$2,000 in premiums. It takes money to put on a real fair, say the fair association directors, and Sherman county seems to be coming to the place where it is worth while to have a real honest-to-goodness fair that is a drawing card, even if it costs a little more money to put it over. One man of considerable repute, who is officially connected with the agricultural fairs of the state passed some very favorable comments on this years event and singled it out as the biggest advertisement for Sherman county that could be had.
