OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Examinations for appointment to West Point will be held in Salem December 17.

Talent has voted \$450,000 bonds to build a reservoir on Emigrant creek, east of Ashland.

The mills of Cottage Grove report they are now getting all the cars they can possibly use.

The state supreme court will begin its eastern Oregon session at Pendleton on October 25.

Apple growers in Hood River valley celebrated Columbus day by making a record pick of apples.

A Harney county health association has been formed to direct the work of the community nurse.

Roy B. Snodgrass of Lebanon has died from injuries received when his horse fell on the pavement.

The first carload of apples has been shipped from Stanfield. The crop will not be so good as estimated.

Sheriff La Bare of Columbia county has seized a still within five blocks of the courthouse at St. Helens.

One hundred and eighty teachers attended the opening session of the Baker county teachers' institute.

Application to the state land board for loans now exceed the available school funds by more than \$150,000.

The Eugene Chamber of Commerce will raise a fund of \$10,000 for the development of Eugene and Lan county.

A. B. Cooper of Hood River has harvested a fine yield of sorghum stalks, which he will convert into molasses.

Chief Justice McBride of the supreme court has celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his admission to the bar.

Carl Goedke of Grants Pass has died from injuries received when he was struck by a passenger train. He was 77 years old.

A new \$20,000 bakery has been opened at Corvallis. It is of concrete throughout, with hardwood floors and an up-to-date oven.

The city of Myrtle Point will protect its water supply by the purchase of the land at the headwaters of the creek from which it is taken.

The North Pacific Coast conference of the Christian and Missionary Alliance will be held at Hood River from October 26 to October 29.

Douglas county is the only prairie district in the state that has not reported losses of this year's crop ranging from 25 to 50 per cent.

Fourteen claims were filed for the \$750 offered by the city of Pendleton and Umatilla county for the capture of John Laffebear, alias Jack Rathie.

Coos county, whose treasury was increased nearly half a million dollars this year by the settlement of the forfeited land grant, is now out of debt.

No trace has been found of Joseph Rohrer, a hunter who is lost in the thickly-timbered district on the North Umpqua river, 40 miles east of Roseburg.

Harney county stock men organized last week for co-operation in marketing, purchase of supplies, range preservation and the issuance of a brand book.

With the shutting down of the large sawmills nearby and the shortage of freight cars, a fuel famine may result in Eugene this winter, according to wood dealers.

The city of Reedsport has sold its municipal water bonds at \$79 on the \$100. This will make possible the completion of the water system by the first of the year.

The Pheasant company, which operates a large plant in Salem and ships its products to almost every section of the world, has increased its capital stock to \$4,000,000.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday have been set for the dates of the annual land products show to be conducted in Roseburg under the supervision of the farm bureau office.

One of the oldest G. A. R. veterans in the state and the oldest man in Umatilla county, John Gurdane, 97, died at his home in Pendleton following several months of ill health.

Governor Olcott has honored extradition papers in the case of Glenn T. Aldrich, who is wanted at Chicago to answer the charge of passing worthless checks to the amount of \$10,000.

Receipts of the Astoria postoffice during the quarter ending September 30 were \$3000 greater than for the corresponding period last year. Savings deposits showed a gain of \$8000.

Discovery at Horse Butte, nine miles southeast of Bend, of a naturally heated cave, apparently drawing warmth from a subterranean volcanic source, was reported by C. A. Yarnell and H. D. Elide, Bend fuel dealers.

Prune drying in Linn county closed last week and it is now possible to give a fair estimate of the loss to the crop from the continuous showers of the last month. The loss in the county is estimated at one-third of the entire crop.

Work on the Hood River end of the Mount Hood loop highway, for which bids have already been called, will be delayed until later and, instead, improvement of the route between Sandy and Zig Zag will be started at once.

One result of the grand jury investigation of the building of the new schoolhouse at Bay City, Tillamook county, is the arrest of Henry Butler, a former school director, on the charge of receiving \$400 from one of the contractors.

Postmasters have been appointed in Oregon as follows: Maggie L. Demaris, Barnes, Crook county; Belle M. Ladd, Geneva, Jefferson county; Sidney E. West, Lower Bridge, Deschutes county.

As a result of a general force reduction order issued by the Southern Pacific company, 32 railroad employees have lost their positions in various departments of the service in Roseburg.

The Princeton university debating team, which is coming west to meet the teams of Washington and California, has asked for a debate with the University of Oregon during Christmas holidays.

The Blaney commercial club immediately will file a complaint with the state public service commission as the first step in a campaign to secure railroad construction to connect Bend with Burns and Crane.

At least \$50,000 will be spent by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association during the coming year in advertising to the world the merits of Oregon prunes. The Oregon product will be advertised under the name of "Midland."

The seventy-second session of the Congressional conference of Oregon and the annual meeting of the Woman's Home Missionary Union and the Oregon branch of the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Coast met in Forest Grove.

Edward Heard and Seth Hart of Haines have filed application with the state engineer for permission to appropriate water from Rock Creek lake reservoir for a supplemental supply for the irrigation of several hundred acres of land in Baker county.

Hood River apple growers are making fair progress in harvesting their crop despite unfavorable weather conditions. The total yield of the season is now estimated at 1,300,000 boxes, or 60 per cent that of last year. The crop will be about 50 per cent Newtown.

Oregon Agricultural college hens have added another victory to their credit by winning first place in the all-northwest egg-laying contest conducted at Pullman, according to Professor Dryden, in charge of poultry husbandry.

Hundred of thousands of acres of lodge pole and jack pine in central Oregon, valueless for timber, may become an important industrial resource.

Experiments conducted under the direction of John Steidl of Bend and Dr. U. C. Coe of Portland have demonstrated that a good grade of commercially valuable paper can be manufactured from the pine.

The Langella valley irrigation district has made application to the irrigation securities commission for the certification of \$200,000 of a bond issue of \$900,000 which was voted for development of the project. This district includes an irrigable area of approximately 20,500 acres and is located in the upper part of Lost River valley near the town of Langella Valley in Klamath county.

This week is "buy a note secured by livestock" week among the bankers of the state, according to announcement of C. D. Rorer, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Oregon Bankers' association. Mr. Rorer sent out a bulletin to the members of the association calling attention to this campaign, which is planned by the agricultural committee in order to help the livestock situation.

The application of Fort Klamath Meadows company of Fort Klamath covering the appropriation of 118 second-feet of the waters of Four-Mile creek, Seven-Mile creek and Ann creek, tributaries of Upper Klamath land, for the irrigation of 9318 acres of land has been approved by Percy A. Cupper, state engineer. It is estimated that the construction work will cost approximately \$240,000.

Immediate opening of the Tillamook highway near Willamina, which Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, in a communication sent recently to the Oregon public service commission, alleged was in almost impassable condition because of operations of the Willamina & Grand Ronde Railroad company, was directed in a letter prepared by Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the public service commission and directed to officials of the railway.

The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has announced that it has secured the services of J. W. Brewer as field secretary and a campaign is to be started immediately for the organization of farm clubs throughout the state. George Quayle, general secretary of the chamber, reported that Mr. Brewer's work will pre-eminently be to encourage land settlement, to get people on the land and to encourage those now on the land to stay there.

Harding Replies to Wilson Query. Marion, O.—In reply to an inquiry from President Wilson, Senator Harding wrote the White House that although France had sent her "spokesmen" to him informally asking America to lead the way for an association of nations, the incident had not involved the French government in any violation of international proprieties.

Vancouver Mayor Missing. Vancouver, Wash.—G. R. Percival, mayor of this city, has been missing since 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, when he was seen near the Liberty hotel, walking back and forth inspecting the pavement newly laid there. He carried his overcoat on his arm.

Idaho Given 431,228 by U. S. Census. Washington.—The census bureau announced the 1920 population of the State of Idaho, 431,228; increase 104,222, or 24.6 per cent.
