Attorney Bright was found dead in his back office early Tuesday morning after a search of several hours when he failed to return. It is thought that the direct cause was an attack of apoplexy, from which he had suffered previous seizures. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at The Dalles. Mr. Bright was early identified with the history of Sherman county, residing at Wasco, where in 1888 he established the first newspaper in what is now Sherman county. This was the present Sherman County Observer which he soon after sold and after some years at Wasco was moved to Moro when this city was first platted and helped ever since build up this section of Oregon.
