ANTI-ALIEN LAW IS DRASTIC

California No Longer Permits Japanese to Lease Farms.

Sacramento, Cal.—California's new and more drastic anti-alien land law, an initiative act approved at the general election last month, is now effective.

It withdraws the three-year agricultural land leasing privileges from aliens ineligible to citizenship and seeks to close loopholes in the original law of 1913 through which, it is said, Japanese were continuing to gain control of California farm land.

Specifically it provides that no alien ineligible to citizenship nor any organization controlled by such aliens may act as guardian of a minor who, because of birth in this country, may legally acquire agricultural land.

Uncle Sam Making Big Guns.

Washington. — Production of ordnance material, particularly main battery guns and fire control instruments, for the seventeen major ships now under construction for the navy progressed satisfactorily throughout the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of Rear Admiral Charles B. McVay, Jr. chief of the bureau of ordnance.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Japan has recognized the new Mexican government, according to a report. Horace E. Dodge, automobile manufacturer, died at his Palm Beach, Fla., home.

A peace treaty between Armenia and the Turkish nationalists is reported to have been signed.

J. R. Howard of Iowa, was unanimously re-elected president of the American Farm Bureau federation at the closing session of the organization. Official notification of the result of the plebiscite in Greece and an invitation's return to Athens and reascend the Greek throne immediately were received by King Constantine.

George Boyd, Terrence Pitts and Charles Valento, accused of having murdered James A. Petray, sheriff of Sonoma county, and Miles Jackson and Lester M. Dorman, detectives of San Francisco in Santa Rosa, Cal., were taken from the county jail in Santa Rosa, and lynched by a mob.

Rail Rate Rises Upheld.

Milwaukee, Wis.—The state of Wisconsin was enjoined in federal court from interfering with enforcement of the order of the Interstate commerce commission establishing a 3.6 cents a mile passenger rate and other increases in rates on railroads in Wisconsin.

Bryan To Visit Harding.

Marion, O.—President-elect Harding has invited William Jennings Bryan, former secretary of state in President Wilson's cabinet, to confer with him here December 17 in regard to the plan for an association of nations.

Appeals for Hungry Children.

Washington.—President Wilson has appealed to the American people to contribute funds for the relief of three and a half million children in Central Europe who are described as facing starvation.

Textile Labor Pay Cut.

Boston.—A reduction by about 25 1/2 per cent in the wages of approximately one-third of the 300,000 textile workers in New England was announced here.

War Costs United States 24 Billions. Washington.—The net cost of the war to the American government was fixed by Secretary Houston at \$24,010,000,000.

Ponzi Now Behind Bars.

Plymouth, Mass.—Charles Ponzi has started serving his sentence of five years for fraud. He obtained millions of dollars from thousands of persons.

THE PUBLIC AND THE TELEPHONE COMPANY

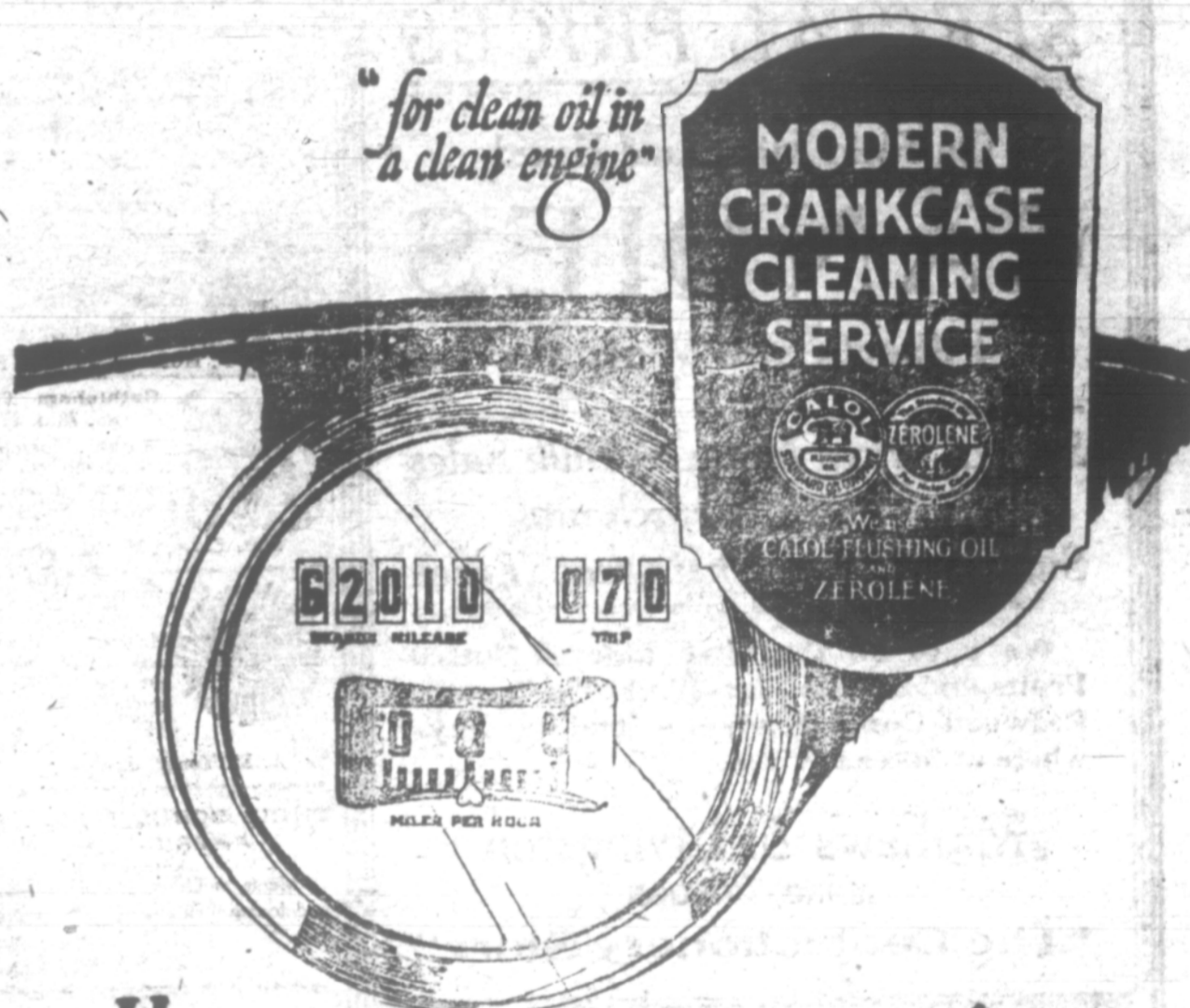
In spite of the fact that a great majority of the telephone using public thoroughly understand the rights, duties and obligations of public service companies, we find now and then an individual who does not understand the matter.

A telephone company, in its broadest sense, is a partnership consisting of the State as an institution, the public as a group of customers, and the company. The State determines the extent to which the company may go and regulates its rates, services and practices. The company furnishes the facilities with which these rights are exercised and the services rendered. Those members of the public who constitute the customers, furnish the revenue with which the company is enabled to perform these services. No telephone company can exist without customers, and these customers must be treated with fairness both by the company and by the State. The State does not permit any undue burden to be placed upon a customer.

A public service corporation, in a broad sense, is merely an organized right to render the public a service, and in the same larger sense the service belongs to the company's customers. It follows that the customers are really the company. What benefits or harms the one has a like effect upon the other.

We are anxious that our present customers, applicants for service, and the company shall be treated fairly. To continue to extend our service under our present condition is impossible. We invite our customers, the public of Oregon, to interest themselves in our problem.
