State Farm Marketing Bureau

The State Farm Bureau perfected
its organization in Portland Tuesday
of this week with fifteen county Farm
Bureaus ratifying. Tuesday after-
noon and Wednesday were given over
to the making of plans for a state-
wide wheat marketing scheme. The
Farm Bureau had the cooperation of
the state Farmers Union and the
Grange on this problem. As a result,
a contract embodying the strong fea-
tures of the contracts used by the
Washington, Idaho, Montana, and Can-
ada bureaus is being drafted and will
be presented for the consideration of
the wheat farmers probably by Satur-
day, January 22d, when it is expected
a meeting will be called at The
Dalles. The contract carries the long
term non-profit sharing features which
have been found essential. Those at-

January 9th, at the home of his
daughter Mrs. J. P. Strahl, Peter P.
DeMoss died at the age of 86 years.
Funeral services were held Tuesday
from the Lents Baptist church, inter-
ment being at his former home near
Estacada where Mrs. DeMoss was
buried. "Uncle" Peter was one of
the early pioneers of Oregon; crossing
the plains twice by ox team and also
making a third trip west by way of
Panama. He was a veteran of two
Indian wars in Oregon as well as a
miner who knew first hand the rough
nature of the early mining camps.
Mr. DeMoss was a resident of Moro
for several years.
