Official Paper for Sherman County.

In a special letter to the Observer from H. C. Hickson, formerly living at Rufus but now at Chicago, he states that he has just returned to his studies at the Moody Bible Institute after a two weeks' evangelistic tour with three fellow students to Moline and Rock Island, Illinois, and Davenport, Iowa. Services were conducted in 11 churches, with audiences totaling 2065. There were 71 professed conversions. Mr. Hickson came to Rufus several years ago from Sidney, Australia, and after a residence of several months left for the Chicago school. He is preparing for the foreign missionary field.

The local town team basketball champions have not yet lost a game this season, their last triumph being that over the Tygh Valley visitors on Friday evening of last week when Moro won with a score of 28 to 18. The Tygh Valley team next day played the Wasco town team where they won the game by a 26 to 14 score. The names of the victors, as given to this office by A. M. Young, their old neighbor, were Glenn and Arthur Morris, Guy Brittain, Joe Muller, A. G. Wood and John Morrow, the last named being referee of both games.

Mathews & Livingston have rented part of the present post office room and will remodel the vacant store room at the rear of where the post office is now located for their billiard and pool room and cigar trade. They will use the place occupied by the billiard tables as a store room in connection with their ice cream and confectionery department. The move, when completed, will allow each branch of the business to be located in separate buildings with a private connection between.

A contract has been signed by 15 residents of Moro with the Ellison-White Co. for a 5-feature lyceum course for next winter. This will replace the winter festival of the last few years and will substitute for the lyceum course sponsored by the high school during the last two seasons. The guarantee contract amount for the lyceum is about the same as for the chautauqua, the only difference is said to be that one comes bunched and the other is spread over intervals.

The people in the Hay Canyon neighborhood on Sunday, January 9th, surprised the pastor with an unusually large attendance. More than sixty people were in attendance at the services that day. It was a delight to meet so many people at divine worship. Sunday is the next regular preaching day. The sermon subject will be "Christianity in Earnest." Come again. Preaching this coming Sunday, in Moro at 7:30 p.m.

These winter evenings are being enjoyed by the younger generation by means of coasting parties on First street hill and by the older set with sleigh parties to the accompaniment of musical sleigh bells.

The Wonders of America

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK.

YELLOWSTONE, our oldest and largest national park, is considerably larger than the state of Delaware. Its altitude ranges from 6,000 to 11,000 feet above sea level. It contains such a large collection of weird and freak natural phenomena that the visitor gains the impression the Great Creator of all things must have roamed over the world, collecting all the odd things he saw, dumping them here in one great disordered heap.

There are more geysers than in all the rest of the world put together. They range from tiny openings, spouting water but a few feet, at intervals of a few minutes, to the great giant, larger than a well, projecting a column of water 250 to 300 feet high, for a period of several minutes at intervals of several days. There are numerous waterfalls, the great fall of the Yellowstone river in the gorgeously colored, 20-mile-long Grand canyon, being 808 feet high. There are many hot springs and small lakes, also the largest lake—Yellowstone—at its height in North America. There are several paint pots—great cauldrons of bubbling, hissing mud; many steam vents and boiling pools, a natural bridge, a roaring mountain, a mountain of volcanic glass, petrified trees and wedged trees. At Norris basin is said to be the thinnest known portion of the earth's crust. Standing there, the visitor needs no assurance that his stanic majesty resides near by.

Yellowstone, known far and wide for its wild flowers, is also the largest wild game preserve in the world.

"The Wings of the Morning"

Captain Robt Anstruther (William Farnum) is attached to the British garrison at Singapore. As a close personal friend of the commandant, Col. Costabel, he is pained at a flirtation the colonel's wife is having with Lord Ventnor, also of the British army service. The colonel leaves for a trip to the interior, and his wife and Ventnor keep a rendezvous. Anstruther hears of this and tries to prevent a scandal when he learns the colonel is returning. Ventnor accuses Anstruther of annoying the colonel's wife and Lady Costabel bears out the lie when her husband returns. Anstruther is court-martialed and dismissed from the army in disgrace.

Hiding his identity under the name of Robert Jenks, Anstruther becomes a sailor on the steamship Sirdar, which is owned by Sir Arthur Deane, whose daughter Iris is on board. During a typhoon in the China sea the boat is forced on the jagged rocks of an uncharted island and wrecked. The only survivors are Iris and Anstruther the latter rescuing the girl as the ship goes down.

The news of the disaster becomes known in Singapore and Sir Arthur Deane, accompanied by Lord Ventnor, start out in a government gunboat to find some trace of his daughter and the ship. For weeks the couple live on the island, braving many perils. They find a cave, which they fit up as their abode with salvage from the wreck. They also discover a valuable gold mine. One day the island is visited by a band of marauding pirates and they discover Iris alone on the beach. Anstruther rescues her from their clutches. More determined than ever to possess the girl, the pirate chief and his band returns and start a siege. When Anstruther is about to be overwhelmed, the gunboat with Sir Arthur and Ventnor on board arrives and the pirates are routed. Sir Arthur is overjoyed at finding his daughter safe while Ventnor, who recognizes Anstruther, is amazed at the turn of events. Iris tells her father she is engaged to marry her rescuer.

Ventnor is furious and threatens to withdraw his financial support from Sir Arthur if the match is not broken off. Sir Arthur refuses to interfere. Lady Costabel, learning that Ventnor had gone in search of Iris, becomes enraged and tells her husband she had falsely accused Anstruther. The colonel takes steps to vindicate Anstruther on his arrival at Singapore. Ventnor on his arrival is court-martialed and sent from the army in disgrace. Anstruther and Iris file on their claim for the gold mine on the island and explain to Sir Arthur that they are wealthy and well able to finance his interests. They are wedded, and sail for their possessions on their honeymoon trip.

Negro Jubilee Singers January 24th
