Unmarried war veterans must return to the government as income tax four per cent of any disability payments they receive in excess of \$1000 a year. The U. S. treasury department has ruled that it could not exempt such ex-service men, although those still in the service are required to pay only on amounts in excess of \$3500 a year.
