House bill 41 in the Oregon state legislature carries the reapportionment of the senatorial and representative districts for the next ten years. If enacted into law as proposed, Sherman county will be joined with Jefferson, Crook, Wheeler, Gilliam and Morrow counties as a senatorial district entitled to one state senator. For state representative Sherman will be joined with Jefferson and Crook counties and entitled to but one representative. Under the new dispensation Sherman county would have a hard time ever electing any one to the state legislature that would have any knowledge of or interest in this county. This result would most probably fit into the plans of the politicians who control the situation.
