Fairview School Starts Bank

The Fairview school has established a savings bank for the pupils of district 21. It has been organized with a view to remedy the evils of the thrift stamp system, and Jessie Conlee claims the distinction of being the first pupil in Sherman county to make a deposit in a school savings bank. Lily Thompson, Harvey Thompson and Jessie Conlee are the first in Sherman county, and probably in the state, to buy stock in such an institution.

The Savings Bank of Fairview has not completed its organization, but it had on hand the first day more money than the thrift stamp system netted for the whole year. All the pupils are enthusiastic and it is believed that every pupil will have a bank account before the week is gone, besides owning all the stock of one hundred shares. Once the pennies are dropped in the Savings Bank of Fairview they are safe from the wiles of the confectionary man. Fire crackers, pop corn, candy, ice cream, and chewing gum can not reduce the capital stock or deposits. Graduation from the school is the earliest way by which a pupil can withdraw his account.

Next Monday officers will be elected and the bank will start on its first year of adventure. If it is a success it is quite likely that more of them will be established in the county and in other sections of the state.

Notes From Moro School

Mr. Mack's manual training classes are planning on building a 6-room bungalow on some lot near the school house. If these plans are carried out the electrical wiring will be done by the physics class.

According to the financial report given by the treasurer in assembly Thursday afternoon, the high school had on hands \$85.88. This amount was materially decreased, however, by the expenses of the lone trip.

Assembly Monday afternoon was conducted by the Freshman and the 7th and 8th grades. They gave us an interesting program. One visitor, Rev. McVicker, was present. Mr. Fagan announced that in the future a critic will be appointed to judge each entertainment and report in the next assembly meeting.

A yell and serpentine practice was held Monday afternoon in the auditorium. We learned a new song and practiced the serpentine.

The basket ball game between Moro and Lone at the latter town last Friday evening resulted in a tie of 26 to 26. The contest was the best scrap either team has played this year. The first half was overwhelmingly in favor of Lone, the Egg City boys scoring 12 points to our one. This being accounted for by the slick dancing floor used in Lone. Our boys could not keep their footing since they are not used to such a floor. In the last half we gave every body a surprise and gained 25 points to Lone 14, tying the score. We then agreed to play five minutes longer to take off the tie, but, after three minute play, Andersen was accidentally hurt by running his head against the wall. As we had no substitutes, the referee called a foul for keeping out of the game over a minute. Davidson of Lone shot and missed so the game remained a tie. During the last few minutes when the game was a tie the crowd went wild. Every kind of a noise imaginable and some unimaginable were uttered. Urquhart was high man, making 16 points—6 field baskets and 4 foul baskets. Devius was high point man for Lone, making 10 points.

The lone boys and girls will be here this week to play a return game. We will assure you a good game and a victory for Moro, so every body come.

Two games never reported in the Portland papers although of importance in basket ball circles, were the

games in which lone and Hoggins beat Fossil. Fossil has been considered as the Eastern Oregon champion team. The Fossil and Moro teams are pretty evenly matched in weight and ability so if you want to see a fine game, just come around to the school auditorium next Friday evening, February 18th.

The boys and girls who turned out to the basket ball practice received a pleasant surprise Thursday afternoon, February 3d, when Miss Lloyd and Mrs. Muir gave them a feed in the Domestic Science room. Ice cream and cake was served. Mr. Mack also helped by washing the paper plates.

Samuel Justin Sparks, the speaker scheduled on the Lyceum Course for April 29th, blew in town Thursday morning February 3d through a misunderstanding with the Lyceum people. At the request of Mr. Fagan he addressed the High School on the subject of "The Educational Work in the Mountainous Regions of Kentucky and West Virginia." Mr. Sparks is connected with the schools of that region and intimately acquainted with John Fox Jr., author of "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine." He tells us that the famous story is not fictitious, but an actuality. His talk was very interesting and we are sure everyone will enjoy hearing him on the Lyceum Course in April.

Preventive Dentistry for Children

The age old fallacy that baby teeth are not important is at the bottom of much tooth neglect and is the first of many mistaken ideas some parents have regarding the value of these teeth. It is rare indeed that temporary teeth have anything wrong with them when they erupt. Nature's work, so far, has been good.

But why is it that over eighty per cent of children have defective teeth before reaching the age of six years? The answer is, because so many parents think it useless to care for children's teeth. In reality, all parents love their children and want to see them have the best possible chance to develop mentally and physically.

Children who have large cavities in their teeth and have nerves exposed are inclined to masticate their food improperly. When they are seated at the dinner table and meat is passed they will say "no thank you, I do not want any." Mother says, "Why, I thought you liked this kind of meat." The answer will come back "it hurts my teeth." The result is the child does not receive the variety of food it should and along with an occasional night of tooth ache the child becomes nervous and irritable in the home and in the school room as well, which may lead a little later in the child saying "I do not want to go to school any longer."

Good health for a child along with encouragement by parents in proper direction, means success in the majority of cases for that child.

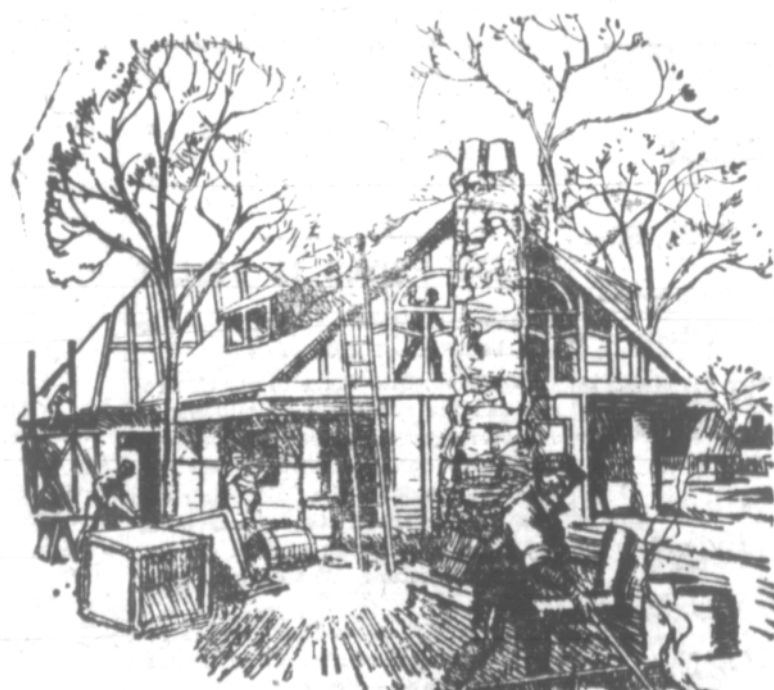
