County Basic Farm Wage Scale

By C. C. Calkins, County Agent
It is the duty of the labor com-
mittee of the Farm Bureau to investi-
gate labor conditions and set wages
for spring, harvest and fall work. In
this period of readjustment this is not
an easy task. Such a scale should be
uniform throughout eastern Oregon
and Washington. Recognizing this,
the labor committee has been in touch
with all the Farm Bureaus of eastern
Oregon and Washington by corre-
spondence through the local Farm Bu-
reau office. The actions being taken
by these organizations is very uniform
and the wages set are a fair average
of the wages set over the territory
mentioned.

The employment offices from which
the Farm Bureau office has been secur-
ing the help stated that plenty of men
should be available at figures which
again are about an average with the
scale set for Sherman county which
runs as follows: Common help, \$40
and board and room; married men,
\$60 to \$70, depending on how much
besides house will be furnished; trac-
tor men, \$4 per day and board and
room; cooks, \$30 per month. The
drop from \$75 to \$40 is just about in
keeping with the price of farm com-
modities. It looks like a large cut
when the price of living is considered,
but the fact that living has not reduced
in proportion affects the farmer
only where he is furnishing the board.
These wages are basic and will be
paid all men secured to come in and
work, there is a difference in men
which may be recognized by the farm-
ers when hiring local experienced help.
