Fair View Bank Holds Election

The Fair View Bank is still alive and doing business at the same old stand. Nearly all of the stock is taken and the deposits more than doubled during the week ending February 24th, 1921.

The following officers were elected for the year 1921: Miss Lilly Thompson, president; Mr. Patay McDonald, vice president; Miss Jessie Conlee, secretary; Lilly Thompson, Julia Saggawa, and Patay McDonald, board of directors; C. H. Zevely, cashier and adviser.

The par value of shares is 25 cents. Value of shares in the Savings Bank of Fair View is 25 cents. This means that the bank has a small surplus.

One boy in the district has requested that none of his money be paid him until he is past 20. This request will be spread on the records and obeyed. At the regular monthly meeting of the share holders on March 4th, a statement will be made and published with any other items of interest that may come up.

New Grain Cleaning Device

A new device known as an aspirator has been designed by specialists of the United States department of agriculture, bureau of markets, for cleaning wheat and other small grains by removing smut, dust, and dockage at the time of thrashing. This device is attached to the grain delivery spout, and tests indicate that it removes approximately one third of what ordinarily is classed as dockage. The use of this device will enable farmers to keep for feed a part of the seeds and other foreign material ordinarily hauled to the elevator and lost to the producer. It also improves the quality of grain by removing from it a large part of the smut dust and objectionable foreign material. A re-cleaning, for attachment to the deck of thrashing machines, also designed, it is said, gives promise of being efficient.

Too Good to Lose

The Treasury department of the United States government is about to issue two new savings stamps. One of them will be worth a dollar. The other will be a savings certificate good for \$25. These issues are to complete the series of savings stamps put into use by the national government. They are intended to finish the work of establishing the savings stamps as a permanent peace-time feature of the service the Treasury department renders the country. This is one of the good effects of the war. The country needed such savings stamps long before they were issued to meet the demands of war finance. They have done much to teach thrift, particularly to children, and they have given many foreigners, suspicious of all banks, the opportunity to make their savings productive and at the same time absolutely secure. It is safe to say that the savings stamps will never be abolished. They have come to minister to the needs of many generations.

Advantages of the Middle Aged

"The middle-aged mothers who have successfully managed large homes and sent out their children as good citizens have proven that such training is invaluable in any national or public work. Any organization requiring intricate knowledge and care of detail work can be handled well by such women, just as well as by the younger women whom we have been led to believe are the only leaders of the 'new race,'" says a writer in Independent Woman. "The middle-aged woman has countless opportunities for world usefulness. One of the most vital opportunities to keep middle-aged women in active touch with the world of moving and dramatic values has been the granting of the vote. Already she is being elected to responsible public office, serving efficiently on juries and receiving public appointments to positions of trust and honor. She has found her place in the world procession."

Public sentiment towards birds is changing. Their economic importance is realized more today than ever before. Every research laboratory in the world has studied and experimented with leprosy and means of its cure, just as they have with tuberculosis, cancer and other deadly diseases, but not one of them had learned the exact nature of the disease or its remedy until a few years ago it was discovered that an oil made from the chaulmoogra plant, a native of Asia, had alleviating effects upon the disease. It was taken in hand and seriously studied and practically experimented with, until now it is considered a specific. By its use new cases appear to be easily curable, while there are instances of the restoration of some lepers whose cases had progressed to an almost fatal degree.

The industrial fatigue research board is undertaking many inquiries into the conditions of factory work and their effect upon the worker. Amongst the ideals which it hopes one day to realize is the establishment of a research institute at which boys may be tested to find out what class of work they are most suited for. Though this ideal of setting each person to fulfill his proper function is old as Plato, we have not made as much progress towards attaining it as we should have done in two thousand years and more. How many of the tragedies of life are due to misfits in trade and industry, and how much waste of good material by the misapplication of energy!

That doctor who appears as the most recent missionary of the return to normalcy in feet would accomplish more with the young ladies if, instead of picturing to them the horrors of broken health resulting from high heels and narrow shoes, he could convince them that foot health was fashionable and possessed attributes of beauty and smartness.

The Berliner Tageblatt bears that Great Britain and France have decided to send a protest to the German government against payments being made to the former kaiser. Here is a chance for the Germans to cut expenses, both gratefully and gracefully.

Care of Teeth in the Home

Care of teeth has a great deal to do with development of decay in the tooth and with diseased conditions of the gums. The proper care of the teeth should begin with the child early in life. The habit is easily acquired then and easily becomes a part of the daily toilet that will be followed all through life.

Under the "Care of the Teeth" a great many will ask "What kind of tooth paste is the best?" I would say to this it is not the kind of tooth paste that you use, so much as the amount of the proper kind of brushing you give your teeth. There is no tooth paste known that will prevent decay of teeth. A good tooth paste, however, will assist you in cleaning your teeth.

The most important thing in the Care of the Teeth is a thorough brushing, not only of the teeth, but of the gums as well. The brushing of the gums does three things:

1st. It forces food particles out from between the free margins of the gums and the teeth;

2d. It causes the gums to grow in the approximate spaces between the teeth, thus keeping food from collecting and remaining in these spaces;

3d. It causes a good circulation of blood through gums and periodontal membrane surrounding each tooth.

The brushing thoroughly twice daily of the gums with a soft brush used in a rotating manner is the best preventive known for development of Pyorrhea. Before the gums are brushed in this manner, however, you should be certain there is not tartar and deposits on your teeth, as much brushing will irritate the gums, causing them to bleed.

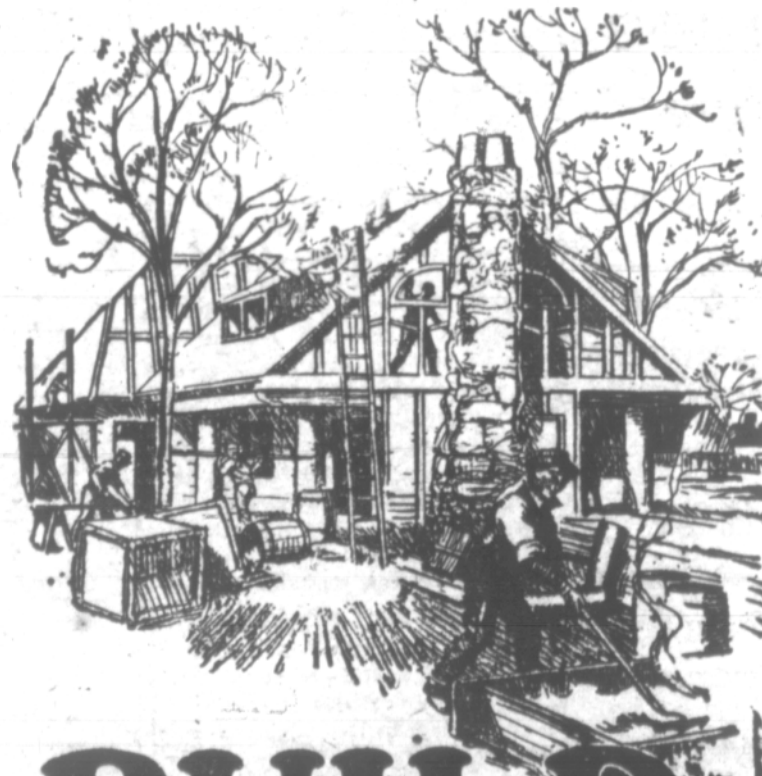
