Moro "Clean-Up-Day" Next Friday

The local American Legion Post has decided Moro needs a thorough cleaning up of the many unsightly piles of rubbish and tin cans that now infest the streets and alleys of our city and to that end have taken hold of the proposition in a most characteristic manner.

To forward the movement and make the job a most complete one, Mayor N. W. Thompson has declared Friday, March 25th, the day selected by the members of the American Legion a local holiday.

The city has been districted and each section has been placed in charge of a captain who will have a squad of nine men and all will compete with other teams in the clean-up campaign results. Following is the list of teams and the captain in charge of each:

For the convenience of our city out-of-town friends the committee in charge wish to emphasize that no place of business in Moro will close during Clean Up Day. The lists have been prepared so that each business house will have some one there to take care of the wants of customers who may come into town during the day.

All listed men on the teams and any others who will join in the day's work who may have been overlooked when the lists were prepared are expected to report for orders at the assembly and parade grounds at the Bank of Moro corner promptly at 8:30 a. m., in proper uniform and armed with implements consistent with the line of duty placed as the Order of The Day, particularly is every one requested to come provided with hoes, shovels, rakes, etc., as their possession of these articles of merit will allow.

Reinforcements for the Clean Up Army will be brought up and go into action under direction of the Legion at noon, when Hot Dogs and Coffee will be served at the noon hour. It is expected that there will be no dogs at large after night fall of this eventual day, as the committee in charge of this feature of the day had considerable experience with the A. E. F.

Incidentally, but not at all least, on the program of the day's activity, will be a Big Dance in Moro Opera House the same evening under the auspices of the American Legion and a GOOD supper is promised for that occasion by the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Slogan adopted by a rising vote of the community is "To the Dump Yard with Tin Cans and Rubbish." Now, let's all turn out and help the American Legion membership in their efforts to make our community that much a better place in which to claim residential honors.

Grain Growers Elect Officers

In accordance with the terms of the Wheat Growers Agreement, which provided that should fifteen million bushels of wheat be signed to the Oregon, Washington and Idaho Wheat Growers Associations prior to March 1st, a meeting of the Oregon members would be immediately called to elect directors to serve until the regular June election.

A number of Sherman county farmers went to Arlington Saturday to attend the meeting and among the number attending from Moro were W. S. Powell, W. H. Ragdale, O. G. Sayre, J. N. Landry, Hans Thompson, D. H. Wright, C. S. Calkins, and County Agent C. C. Calkins. Others in attendance were Matt Simon of Kent, and V. H. Smith of Wasco.

The following men were elected to have charge of the affairs of the Association: A. R. Shumway, Milton, chairman of the board of directors; V. H. Smith, Wasco, secretary-treasurer; W. S. Powell, Moro; Fred Wise, Condon; Howard Andersen, Heppner; Herbert Olden, Heppner; C. A. Harth, The Dalles; A. V. Swift, Baker.

At a directors meeting, held subsequent to the general meeting, Edgar L. Ludwick, formerly with the Washington Wheat Growers, was chosen Organization Director of the Oregon Growers Association. The Oregon Growers are now negotiating with the Washington Association and the State Farm Bureau for a number of men to carry on the organization work in the various localities and expects to have a number of workers in the field this coming week.

Moro Colony at Bend

A letter received recently from Mrs. L. Grimes, now residing at Bend, Oregon, states that they have been having lovely weather, it not having frosted for several nights at the time of writing and that the winter in general was a very open one.

Moro people who have moved to Bend, Mrs. Grimes said, were having much bad luck with sickness. Her own health was poor and she was under the doctor's care all the time with what was said to be a cancerous condition of the stomach that had affected the left limb, due in large part to her operation last spring.

Lloyd Grimes had been confined to his bed some two weeks with a severe attack of grippe. Lloydene had had a serious attack of throat trouble, leaving her glands in the neck affected, and Mrs. Grimes had also been sick. Mr. G. being the only member of the family who had escaped any real ailment.

Lee C. Roberts, who last year farmed near DeMoss, had also a very hard spell of bad luck. He had been in the hospital several weeks with pneumonia and was only out a few days when his eleven months old baby died of pneumonia, following measles and whooping cough. His 3-year old child has been hovering between life and death for several days but was reported better. Three others in the Roberts family have been sick with measles and whooping cough, Mrs. Roberts being the only member of the family who has not been seriously sick.

Business and working conditions are better now at Bend. The Brooks & Scanlon mill is running one shift and are building 13 miles of railroad to their timber and have an order for 500 new railroad cars. This is the mill where Mr. Grimes and son are employed. The other mill, Brooks & Hickson, are planning to start up on April 1st with full crews.

In a baseball meeting held in the laboratory Wednesday afternoon, Ray Messenger and Dale Lusk tied in the election of a captain. It was decided that baseball practice will be held Tuesday and Thursday after school every week, starting on Tuesday the 15th. Mr. Fagan urged every one to turn out to practice and help make a good team.

Baseball dates are now being arranged. Games may be played with Heppner, Ione, Fossil, Grass Valley, and Wasco. Nothing is certain as yet, so definite dates will not be announced. A meeting of the Wasco, Grass Valley, and Moro principals will be held Saturday to make dates between these schools.

A recent report received from State Superintendent Churchill shows 20,551 students in the Oregon High Schools. Out of this number 12,948 take English, 3,292 Algebra, and 5,000 Latin. The effects of the recent war is shown by the fact that only one pupil in Oregon takes German.

A new vaulting pole has recently been received by the High School.

DENTAL HYGIENE

One of Series of Articles Written Specially

The Best Time is Now

It is very encouraging to think that "It is never too late to mend," but when mending is postponed too long there is so much damage done that there is nothing left but the repair. The best way to avoid damage is to take care in the first place. If a child is taught to take care of his baby teeth from infancy, those teeth will do their work and give comfort, health and beauty. The teeth, the gums, the tongue and the cheeks of every child, should be brushed thoroughly twice each day.

Every child should have its own brush and a can of good tooth powder or a tube of tooth paste. The brush must be kept very clean. When the teeth are to be washed, the brush should be wet in running water and the paste or powder placed on the brush. Then the chewing surface of the teeth should be thoroughly brushed, both above and below. Wet the brush again and brush thoroughly the lingual or tongue side of the teeth. First scrub them well with a circular movement, then place the brush at the gum margin on each tooth in turn and brush straight to the chewing surface, paying particular attention to cleansing the spaces between the teeth. Repeat this on the labial, or outside, surface of the teeth, using plenty of water and dentifrice.

After these movements have been completed, brush the inside of the cheeks and lips, then the gums and finally the tongue. Rinse the mouth with clean water or a mild mouth wash, then wash the tooth brush and hang it up to dry until it is time for the next "tooth bath."

Don't put two or more tooth brushes in one container. Hang up every brush by itself so that it will not be touched by any other. Medicated dentifrices should not be used by children. What they need is just thorough scrubbing of the teeth twice each day with clean water and a mild pleasant tooth paste or powder.
