The Sherman Highway

As a result of the inspection last week of the highway possibilities of Sherman county by the members of the State Highway Commission it was definitely decided at the April meeting of the Commission, just concluded, to put the Sherman Highway on the official highway map of the state, this to be a north and south route through the county from Biggs to Shaniko following in the main the present route and from Shaniko turning southwest to a junction with The Dalles California Highway.

A number of Wasco county people say that Sherman county has secured The Dalles California Highway that should go through their county, but this is not the case. The two routes are separate—as much as is the West and East Side Pacific Highways through Western Oregon to a junction south of Prineville. A matter little understood by wasco county people is that through the efforts of A. M. Wright of this city, State Representative from this district, the last legislature bettered the route for Wasco county by making it 20 miles shorter to The Dalles and the construction cost cut more than \$340,000 in Wasco county.

Building of both routes are contingent upon financial aid from the counties of Wasco and Sherman and in this matter Sherman county will secure first action because we have a bond issue voted by this county two years ago that is probably enough to take care of our part while Wasco county must vote an additional bond issue of \$800,000 to finance their route as planned by the State Highway Commission.

Through this action of the State Highway Commission our contention that Sherman county should be considered and aided in building a north and south highway is vindicated. This was conceded by the State Highway Commission more than two years ago and several times since. A large factor in making this decision was the shorter distance for traffic if a means of connection with The Dalles California Highway could be found that would be both feasible and economical and shorten the distance for traffic using The Dalles California Highway in passing from and to Eastern Oregon points to California. The Sherman Highway permits this, while the change in distance mentioned above also shortens the distance for traffic originating in Western Oregon.

DENTAL HYGIENE

One of Series of Articles Written Specially For the Observer by Dr. Howard Gove

School Children's Teeth

The following extract from a lecture by Dr. Alfred C. Fones, director of Dental Department, city of Bridgeport, Conn., should give grave concern to parents. The picture portrayed is vivid and the figures startling, but there is every reason to believe that Dr. Fones is conservative in his statements. Mothers and fathers who wish their children to be physically strong and mentally bright must realize the dangers that arise from bad teeth and must see to it that their children are given adequate attention in this important matter.

"If our large steel plants and rolling mills were obliged to re-roll twenty to thirty five per cent of their stock, it would not take the steel company very long to decide to investigate and find out what was the matter and correct it. No business nowadays could stand such a high percentage of loss in doing its work over again. In our public schools throughout the country it is a fair estimate to say that the percentage of grammar school children who are reviewing their grade will range between twenty and thirty five per cent; in the majority of the cities the average will be nearer the latter figure. What is the matter? Is it our system of teaching, crowded schools, poorly lighted or ill ventilated buildings, or is the cause to be found in the material itself, the child?"

"Let us examine the average boy of ten years of age and see what we find. Face, ears, and nose unclean, hair unkempt, hands grimy and finger nails dirty. Shoes splashed with dry or wet mud, clothes soiled, and an odor permeating through the atmosphere to excite suspicion that his little body has not been washed for some time. If his external appearance troubles us, his internal appearance shocks us. Here we find teeth covered with green stain, temporary and permanent teeth badly decayed, possibly fistulas on the gum surface showing an outlet for pus from an abscessed tooth or teeth, and decomposing food around and between the teeth."

"Why examine the child farther? Here at the gateway of the system is a source of infection and poison sufficient to contaminate every mouthful

of food taken into his body. With decomposition instead of digestion taking place in the alimentary tract, it is no wonder that the child suffers from auto-intoxication which produces eye-strain, anemia, malaise, constipation, headache, fever, and many other ailments. Such a mouth is an ideal breeding ground for germ life, and a child with such a mouth is far more susceptible to infectious diseases than one whose teeth are sound and kept free from food debris."
