DENTAL HYGIENE

One of Series of Articles Written Specially For the Observer by Dr. Howard Gore

The Artificial Denture

An artificial denture is commonly called a "set of teeth" or a "plate." It consists of porcelain teeth—fourteen for the upper jaw and fourteen for the lower jaw—placed on a "base plate" made of gold, rubber, aluminum, or other material. Porcelain teeth are usually made from Kaolin, Feldspar and Silica. The product, practically speaking, is similar to the porcelain used in other arts. Some two thousand men make a specialty of this work in the United States and millions of porcelain teeth are made and used.

Porcelain teeth are attached to the base plate of the denture, some by means of platinum pins fused into their back surfaces, others by engaging grooves cut into the tooth so that the denture base plate material is forced into and engages the grooves, thus forming a secure attachment.

A denture is formed over a model obtained from an impression of a patient's mouth. This impression is usually made with plaster of paris or with a material known as "modeling compound" which is softened by a gentle heat.

The science of making artificial dentures is known as prosthodontia and the modern dentist who is an expert prosthodontist can, in many cases, make artificial dentures that are almost as good as the natural teeth in appearance, strength, durability and degree of service afforded their wearer.
