Moro leads the larger schools of
the county in attendance with an av-
erage of 97.3 per cent according to the
report for March, recently received
from the county superintendent's
office. Moro also showed a fair tardiness
record, having only nine per cent
late. Several of the smaller schools
made a 100 per cent average, with
none absent and none tardy. These
schools were Boardman, Monland,
Wilcox, and Gordon Ridge. Moro's
record for this month is slightly bet-
ter than in the last report. Then we
had an average of 97.1 per cent at-
tendance and 1.1 per cent tardiness.

Friday by a score of 15-14. This game

mysterious than before. They have
