DENTAL HYGIENE

One of Series of Articles Written Specially For the Observer by Dr. Howard Gove

Tartar Accumulations

While the saliva looks clear, yet it carries considerable solid matter in solution. It is this solid matter which is deposited on our teeth and is generally known by the name of tartar. The principal constituent of tartar is a material similar to lime. This, with minute particles of food and dead bacteria or germs which always inhabit the mouth in great numbers are held together by mucus—the sticky part of saliva—and make up the bulk of the tartar. By far the greatest amount of deposits are formed on the inner surfaces of the lower teeth. To understand the reason for this, all one has to do is to stand in front of a mirror and raise the tongue. He will then see on the floor of the mouth—right opposite the center of the lower arch—two very small pimple-like projections. These are the openings of the salivary glands situated in that region. As the saliva trickles into the mouth, it is thrown directly against the inner surfaces of the lower front teeth, and some of the solid materials remain upon them.

The second greatest amount of deposit occurs over the first molar, (the first big square tooth) in the upper jaw and, too, for the same reason. There is a big salivary gland buried in the cheek on each side of the face. Its mouth opens directly above these particular teeth. By pulling the cheek back, we can see this opening in the shape of a small triangular flap hanging downward and attached to the inner surface in the center of the cheek.

The amount of tartar that accumulates on the teeth varies with different people. Just what the reason is, we do not know. Some authorities claim that there is a definite relation between the quantity of food consumed and the size of the deposits. That is, hearty eaters will have greater accumulations of tartar than those who eat sparingly. Some dentists claim that tartar is one of the direct causes of pyorrhea. This, probably, is an exaggeration, but no one denies that tartar is, without a doubt, one of the principal contributory factors in bringing on this dreaded disease.

As to how often tartar should be removed is a question that must be answered individually. Some people can go quite a long time, a year or more, without accumulating any deposits. Others again, should have their teeth "scaled" every three months and some even oftener. The dentist is the best judge of that.
