**Notes From Moro School**

"The Moro Midget," our first high school annual has been printed and is on sale. While supervised by the Senior class, this publication is the School's, not the Senior's, and every one is going to do his part to make it a success. The price of \$1.00 may seem large, but it is really small in comparison with the amount charged by other small schools.

Last Thursday afternoon the Juniors took the customary quarter day holiday to look for a place to have the Junior-Senior breakfast. Since the place had already been selected, they made a dummy visit to the Wasco schools.

The Baccalaureate service in honor of the Class of '21 was held Sunday evening at the Methodist church. The service was opened by a song "In the Cross We Glory," followed by prayer by Rev. E. E. McVicker. The text, 1st Corinthians 13th chapter was read by Rev. E. Goudge, pastor of the Congregational church of The Dalles. A solo by Mrs. Marjorie Harper preceded the sermon delivered by Rev. Goudge on the subject of "The Three-fold Dynamic." The service was closed by the song "Onward Christian Soldiers" and benediction by Rev. H. H. Miles.

The Commencement exercises Friday evening will be an occasion of mixed good will and sadness for all students of Moro High School. They will be glad for the graduates, because they have attained their goal, but sad because the school will lose a class of willing workers for the betterment of M. H. S.

The Senior play given last Friday was an overwhelming success both dramatically and financially. All who saw it proclaimed it the best high school play ever staged in Moro. An audience of about 350 people were present and \$152.55 paid admissions were sold. This money, with expenses deducted, will be turned over to the Annual Fund to help pay for the "Midget."

Although the roads were slick and the weather threatening Monday morning, the Junior boys (the girls were mysteriously absent) met the Seniors at the school house and piloted them to the Junior-Senior breakfast. The secret of picnic grounds was out as secrets always are, but nevertheless, because of the roads, highways, by-ways, by-paths, and cow-trails they were taken over by the pilots the Seniors were none too sure of themselves until they stopped at the home of Miss Gwendoline Reese, one of the honorable Juniors, here the guests were seated at a table on which nothing edible could be seen except a glass of water and a cracker around. These, it was explained, constituted the first course and were to be eaten before the next was served. The Seniors quickly devoured this rather sparing diet and yelled for the second course. This, when brought on, proved the first to be a joke, for it consisted of delicious bacon and eggs with biscuits "like mother used to make." The last but by far not the least course (at least in the eyes of Mr. Fagan) was strawberries, cream and cake. Soon after breakfast the picnickers hurried to town to prepare for final examinations.

In one of the most ragged games of the baseball season Wasco slipped us a 10-9 defeat on their home grounds Saturday. Nearly all the players assisted in making the numerous errors and bingles throughout the whole nine innings.

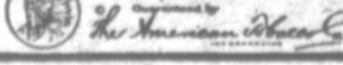

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**Circuit Court Proceedings**

Circuit Court convened in this city Monday with the usual amount of civil actions on the docket, the larger part being passed for the term pending settlement.

State vs Lena Andrews: Two indictments; embezzlement \$1200 from McCoy-Atwood Co., \$200 from Atwood-Lee Co. Plead not guilty, released on bond, case set for first day November term.

State vs George Hooper: Indictment; operation of illicit still. Plead guilty. Fined \$50 and 90 days in jail. Fine paid, sentence suspended pending good behavior.

State vs Lawrence Jones: Indictment, having liquor in possession. Plead not guilty. Tried before following jury: C.W. Johnson, Jas. C. Wilson, E. H. Watkins, Arvid Anderson, Oscar Adams, E. C. Thomas, Emil Andersen, G. C. Andrews, I. K. Axtell, H. C. Thompson, W. A. Murchie, Frank Bartholomew. Verdict of not guilty.

State vs W. H. Callaway: Dismissed upon recommendation of grand jury.

Members of the grand jury were Chas. McAllister, A. S. Porter, Victor Andersen, F. L. Burnet, H. A. VanGilder, A. B. Potter, Herman Schilling.

This was the first term of court during the last 25 years that was not attended by Attorney C. J. Bright, he having died last December. Attorney W. C. Bryant was appointed chairman of a committee to prepare suitable resolutions to be placed among the records of the court at next term. Judge Parker, when appointing the committee, said "Mr. Bright had never knowingly done any man a wrong and I consider as fine an eulogy that could be said of any man. I had known him for the last 10 1/2 years and during that time he has never failed to attend each term of court."
