### "The Copperhead" Coming Saturday

At the outbreak of the Mexican war, Milt Shanks living with his wife and child at Millville, Ill., decides to enlist, but Abraham Lincoln, stopping at their house to get a drink of water, tells Milt it is his duty to remain at home and he reluctantly agrees. At the outbreak of the Civil War, excitement runs high in Millville and it is evident there are many southern sympathizers in town and that Lem Tollard is their leader.

Milt decides to enlist; but he receives a letter from President Lincoln asking him to come to Washington. He complies and becomes a member of the United States secret service charged with the duty of keeping his eye upon the copperheads in his locality. He then plays a double role and when his son Joey and wife upraid him for his lack of patriotism, he tells them he is a man of peace.

Milt gains the confidence of Tollard and learns that he is about to warn the rebels at federal reinforcements are coming. Milt operates to frustrate Tollard's plans, the result being that Tollard's band is attacked and several killed. Milt suffers arrest with Tollard, both are courtmartialed and their sentence of death is commuted to life imprisonment by President Lincoln. Milt is soon pardoned; Joey is slain in battle; Milt's wife dies of a broken heart; forty years pass and Tollard is pardoned and returns home and shoots Milt because of the information he had given the troops. As Milt dies he reveals to his grand daughter and her sweetheart his part in the war and many things are better understood.

### Priscilla Dean in "Outside the Law"

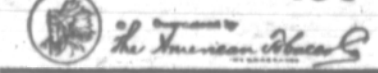

### Wheat Control Order

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Sherman County:

In the matter of creating a Weed Control District in and of Sherman County, Oregon.

Now on this 25th day of May, 1921, the Court being in session for the transaction of County Business, the above entitled matter came on by the Court's own motion for an order declaring Sherman County a Weed Control District, and

It appearing to the Court that certain weeds, namely, the weeds commonly known as the Russian Thistle, Jim Hill Mustard and California Mustard, are prevalent in Sherman County and are noxious weeds and that special effort should be made to control and exterminate them throughout the County and that a Weed Control District should be established in and of Sherman County, therefore,

It is ordered, declared and adjudged by the Court that Sherman County be and it is hereby designated a Weed Control District, under and by virtue of the terms and provisions of Chapter 381, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, and the weeds commonly known as the Russian Thistle, Jim Hill Mustard and California Mustard are hereby declared to be noxious weeds and subject to the provisions of said Chapter 381.

It is further ordered that the county clerk furnish a copy of this order to each of the three newspapers of Sherman County for publication in two consecutive issues thereof, whereupon this order shall be in full force and effect.
