Farm Bureau Harvest Wages

A. H. Barnum, chairman of the Farm Bureau County Labor Committee reports that the County Labor Committee met last week in joint session with the executive committee of the Sherman County Farm Bureau to give consideration to the question of harvest wages. Prior to this meeting the matter had been taken up with the different wheat counties and with the labor centers and the wages set are as high and in many instances higher than those recommended in other places. The wages set and the jobs included under the heads run as follows:

Haying, \$2.00.
Harvest work--common labor--including header tender, sack jig, roustabout, box drivers, hoe downs, straw haulers, hauling wheat to warehouse or elevator, \$3.00.
Loaders, \$3.50.
Sack hewers, drivers, drivers and sack sewers on little combines, header punchers, oilers, and truck drivers, \$4.00.
Caterpillar men, \$7.00.
Separator tender, \$8.00.
Cooks, \$3.00.
Picking up sacks and piling in the field convenient for hauling with trucks, etc., 1 1/2 cents each.

Special Election in Sherman County

According to the election returns in Sherman county from the special election held last Tuesday, this county is in favor of higher taxes when it is known that the funds are to be applied to progress. The voters of the county by their action approved two of the measures submitted to them by the state legislature and turned down the others. Those receiving favorable action were the Soldiers' Bonus law yes 429 no 208; marriage examination law, yes 319 no 295; Those going down to local defeat were the proposed law regulating the sessions of the legislature yes 210 no 372; the emergency clause veto bill, a protection to the initiative law, yes 255 no 268; the women juror law, yes 270 no 309.

Sherman county special measure authorizing a half mill tax next year for County Fair purposes carried with a vote of yes 346 no 249.

IN MEMORIAM

W. H. Andrews, a prominent resident pioneer residing west of Wasco, died unexpectedly Sunday noon as he was getting into his car after closing the gate on his way to Wasco. He had been in ill health for some time, but it was not considered to be serious. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon from the Christian church at Wasco, Dr. Ghormley presching the sermon.

O. H. Rich died early Sunday morning at his Wasco home after an illness of several years. Funeral services were in charge of the Crandall Undertaking Co., of The Dalles, at the Wasco Christian church Monday afternoon, Rev. Roberts pastor of The Dalles Christian church presching the sermon.

The ashes of Mrs. Dora Williams was on Sunday afternoon placed by the side of her husband and son in I.O.O.F. cemetery by the Odd Fellow lodge of this city following a service by the lodge conducted by the lodge chaplain, Rev. H. H. Miles. Mrs. Williams was a very early pioneer of this county and city, conducting the first hotel in Moro for years. She was 96 years old when she died at Pasadena, California, on May 5th last, where services were held by the family and the remains cremated to be forwarded to Moro, as she had often desired before her death.
