Injured by Rock Crusher Belt

Tommy Thompson, owner of the county rock crusher, was painfully injured Saturday morning when the air compressor belt flew off and struck him on the left thigh. Thompson had a water hose drawn under the belt at the time and was wetting down a hot box. It is thought that some water glanced from the steel frame to the flying band or that he accidentally touched the hose to the belt. Those nearby who saw it wobble knew that trouble was imminent and tried to stop the engine. Thompson had taken a few steps toward the belt, in an effort to steady it, when it flew from the pulley on the compressor and hit him with an enormous force. The injured man fell several yards away under the main drive belt. As soon as he was able to be moved he was taken to the Hotel Moro and Dr. Foley called. Though no serious complications were expected, he was taken to Wasco Monday morning for an X-ray examination. By way of compensation the county will pay him his regular salary while he is disabled and will shoulder all medical and hospital bills.

Wasco Celebration Notes

Judge R. R. Butler of The Dalles will be the orator of the day at Wasco July 4th.

All cars moving in Sherman county on the Fourth should be decorated, either with bunting or flags or both.

The celebration committee at Wasco will fully appreciate it if automobile owners and drivers will join in the effort to make this celebration this year something above the average. All can do it, if they get the spirit and one way is to decorate the auto.

Word comes from Wasco that just prior to the grand parade on the morning of the Fourth, it is the intention to crown Miss Margaret Foss as Goddess of Liberty in a formal coronation exercise that will be conducted in a dignified manner consistent with the day and what it represents. It is hoped that the public generally will be able to attend in time to witness this ceremony.

The management in charge of the parade for the morning of the Fourth at Wasco wish it understood that they will individually and collectively appreciate any effort by the public that will help make this a better success. To this end they want all floats in line not later than 10:30 a.m., at which time the parade will start promptly. Any one is at liberty to enter a float or several can join in making the entry.

Moro won the county contest for the Goddess of Liberty at the celebration at Wasco on the 4th and 5th with Margaret Foss as contestant for this place and Alice Farrington as contestant from Wasco. When the contest closed Monday evening the Wasco contestant had 28,000 votes and the Moro representative 38,240. Monday afternoon all Moro business houses joined in a purse of about \$400 which was turned over to a local committee to vote as they thought best to secure the result desired.

Home From California Trip

W. S. Powell and family returned Saturday afternoon from a motor trip to as far south as Long Beach, California, taking three days less than four weeks to make the 2305 miles traveled. The party used their trailer, camping as fancy dictated, going over the Columbia and Pacific highways and returning via Weed over the Interior Oregon highway. They visited Catalina Island and took an ocean trip in the glass bottomed boats at that resort, 29 miles off the California coast. They also visited at Yosemite Park on the return. Mr. Powell reports that the road from 20 miles south of Bend to Madras, except about five miles near Terrebonne, has been surfaced with lava rock, making an excellent roadbed.

Automobile Night Road Law

During the week of July Fourth and the Chautauqua at DeMoss Springs, shortly to be followed by a second Chautauqua week at Grass Valley on the 19th, it has been called to our attention that drivers of automobiles should have knowledge of two sections of the new automobile law that became operative May of this year.

Section 8, paragraph 5—Lights. Every vehicle using the highways of this state at night shall be equipped with a lamp or lamps as hereinafter provided: then come the specifications as to the kind, power and use of head lights, spot lights, and tail lights.

Dimming—When operated at night time, and meeting an approaching motor vehicle, the driver of a motor vehicle shall dim his headlights; provided, however, that any motor vehicle which is not equipped with a dimming device shall maintain as a part of the equipment a spot light so adjusted as to be capable of being thrown to the right hand side of the highway downward, and while approaching and passing such motor vehicle the spotlight shall be substituted for the headlights, and so adjusted as not to blind the occupants of the approaching vehicle.

Complaint is made that drivers of the larger cars using Sherman county roads are forming a habit of crowding smaller cars, particularly Fords, off the highway by reason of strong lights not properly controlled when passing other cars. The above is published for the special benefit of any one who has been careless in this matter and as a warning to discontinue the practice of hogging the road by means of stronger lights. To those who may not take this warning as it is intended, it may be well to add that some night they may be disagreeably jolted and damage happen that could be prevented.
