World Wide Disarmament Conference

President Harding has taken definite steps looking to a conference in Washington of the principal allied and associated powers to discuss limitation of armament. He also has suggested to the interested nations that there be at the same time a discussion of the Pacific and Far Eastern problem with a view of reaching a common understanding.

The question of limitation of armament has a close relation to Pacific and Far Eastern problems, and President Harding has suggested that the powers especially interested in these problems should undertake, in connection with this conference, the consideration of all matters bearing upon their solution, with a view of reaching a common understanding.

Among the nations who will participate in the conference are Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan and China.
