The freight crew knew nothing of the fire until after their arrival in Moro when they assembled volunteers and backed the train to where the grain was burning.

C. W. Smith, operating the Lee and Belah farm near DeMoss, was the first to haul new harvest grain to that station in this county. Saturday evening he had delivered 600 sacks of turkey red and more to follow.

F. L. Burnett was the first to deliver wheat at a Moro warehouse from this year's harvest fields. His teams were on the job early Monday, following beginning of harvesting the crop with the aid of Roy Powell's self propelled Holt harvester.

W. E. Newton's grain is averaging close to 15½ sacks of turkey red to the acre. Like the greater part of the turkey red wheat this year, it carries a large per cent of yellow berries but the plump grains will offset the dockage by the additional weight.

The most serious grain fire occurring in Sherman county in a number of years started in the J. G. Medler field east of Wasco Monday afternoon from an exhaust spark off the caterpillar engine. After a two-hour battle it was brought under control with 150 acres of standing grain destroyed, and 100 acres of stubble with 170 sacks in the field dumps, a combine harvester, and a small unoccupied farm residence. Total damages is estimated at \$12,000. Part of the wheat burned was insured for 15 sacks an acre and was harvesting 18 sacks to the acre.
