Proposals Invited

Subject to all the provisions of Ordinance No. 87 of the City of Moro, Sherman County, Oregon, sealed proposals, addressed to the Common Council of said City, will be received by said Council at the City Hall, on Main St., Moro, Oregon, until 8:00 o'clock p. m. of August 9, 1921, for the completion of the following street improvement, viz:— Surfacing with crushed rock or gravel that portion of First Street from the northwesterly line of the Oregon Washington Railroad & Navigation Company's right of way, to a line parallel with and fifty feet easterly from the center line of said right of way a distance of 100 feet; also grading same and constructing the necessary catch basins and drains, and building concrete curbs and gutters, on the westerly side of said right of way only, the distance between curbs to be 52 feet.

Plans and Specifications have been prepared by the City Engineer and are now on file in the office of the City Recorder.

All work on said street improvement must be completed, and the street ready for public travel thereon, within thirty days from and after the date of the contract awarding said work to the bidder.

Each bid must be accompanied with a certified check for a sum equal to five per cent of the total amount of such bid.

All bids must be endorsed "Proposal for Improvement of First St." The Common Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids if deemed unreasonable.

Bids will be opened on the above date by the Common Council.

The successful bidder will be required to execute the usual bond to the City of Moro, in such cases provided.
