M. Fitzmaurice, appraiser for the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, was in town this week. He had only three applications from this county, which goes to show that Sherman county farmers do not, in the opinion of Mr. Fitzmaurice, need money very badly. Loans made by the Federal Land Bank, main office at Spokane, are beneficial to farmers as the interest rate is only six per cent of which one per cent goes to pay off the loan, liquidating itself in 33 years. A feature of a loan from the Land Bank is that borrowers have to take stock in the Farm Loan Association to the value of five per cent of the loan, to be paid back when the loan is concluded and which pays dividends during the time the loan is in effect. Information pertaining to the operation of the bank can be had by writing D. G. O'Shea, Federal Land Bank, Spokane.

Vernie Coe is nursing two severely cut fingers on his right hand as the result of becoming entangled with the radiator fan on his combine last Thursday. A sudden lurch of the machine caused him to extend his hand into the radiator fan with the result of the bones being broken in both first fingers and the two almost completely severed from the hand. Since the accident recovery has been rapid and he expects to save both fingers, altho it will be months before they are again strong.

The passenger train Monday afternoon set fire to some weeds and bunch grass close to the right of way on the Nicholson quarter west of Moro. About 12 auto loads of fire fighters left town when the alarm was sounded, but the train crew had it out before their arrival. When put under control the fire was just up to the fence and close to a large field of standing grain.

Jay Burlingame, of Blalock, and Mrs. Orpha Elwood, formerly of this city, were married at the home of Dr. C. H. Johns on Monday evening, August 1st, 1921. Rev. Harold H. Miles read the Episcopal service and pronounced them husband and wife. Mr. and Mrs. Burlingame left on the train Tuesday morning for Portland, where they will make their home.

Arthur Christiansen returned home last week from Camp Dix, Kentucky, where he has been attending an Officers Army School Camp. He has been attending Stanford University this last winter and from there he was transferred to Camp Dix, the second Officers Camp School he has attended. He is now a regularly enrolled army officer in the reserve.

The item in last week's Observer to the effect that the Roy Powell machine had had a "hot box fire" was erroneous. Our informant had confused the report from another machine. This correction is made in justice to Roy Benson who has had charge of this machine the last few harvest seasons and at no time has he had trouble of this nature.

David Shearer is visiting with his two sons in Moro, Andy and John. He is a resident of Albany and made the trip via auto over the Pacific and Columbia highway with no one for company and without mishap. Considering his 74 years the old gentleman handles himself remarkably well and appears to be not more than about 60 years old.

Dr. Poley was called and had her removed to his home, later when she was able, they secured quarters at Hotel Moro until their trip could be resumed.

Paving operations has started between The Dalles and Mosier, closing the highway for the first three miles west of the Dalles. After August 8th all highway travel between The Dalles and Mosier must go over the old 7-mile route. This work is independent of the paving being done between Mosier and Hood River.

**Irregular Teeth: Causes, Effects and Treatment**

In the development of the child, nature seems to have a very definite plan for arrangement of the teeth. In infancy there are none, but as the need comes for a more varied diet to provide material for further growth, the temporary teeth appear one after another and take their place in such a manner that those of one jaw meet those of the other so as to perform the functions of biting and chewing very efficiently.

At the age of six the child has grown so much that the small baby teeth no longer are large enough to do the work but the permanent change is very gradual and is not completed even when the last baby tooth has been lost at about twelve years of age.

The second permanent molars come at twelve to fourteen years of age. The second permanent teeth at about eighteen. During all this time from birth to adult life the child is constantly growing. The arrangement of the second set is very similar to the first in the curve lines and the close way the lower lock together with the upper when the jaws are at work.

In studying about irregular teeth, it must be kept in mind that the jaws and teeth are a part of the body, depending on the same nerves, blood supply and sources of nourishment as any other part of the body, and do a very important part of the work in making and keeping the body healthy and vigorous. The relation of the various organs and functions is so close that none can suffer without affecting, in some way all the others.

When for any reason the teeth do not take their place as nature planned they become irregular and do not close together properly and the child cannot chew its food thoroughly, thus lowering the efficiency of the function of the teeth.

What makes the teeth come in irregular? Among all the races of the earth irregularity of teeth is more frequent among the more civilized people; so manner of living must have something to do with it. Heredity plays an important part in irregularity. The real condition which causes irregularity is generally the failure of the bones of the face to grow large enough, or in the right direction to support the full number of teeth in the correct position, so anything that affects general body growth affects the bones of the face.

Another cause of irregularity of teeth is too early extraction of the temporary teeth. The child's first teeth should be watched carefully and cavities filled as soon as they appear, so as to avoid the loss of these teeth. Mouth breathing is one of the causes of irregular teeth. This is generally caused by adenoids or enlarged tonsils, in which case the tonsils or adenoids should be removed.

Abcesses of the teeth have a very great influence on the general health, and thus indirectly on the local growth and they should, and would not, occur if proper attention were given to the teeth by having the small cavities filled. If baby teeth are neglected the permanent teeth are very apt to be irregular.

Irregular teeth affect the entire system. It throws the nervous system out of balance. The food is improperly prepared for the stomach and such teeth will usually develop pyorrhea as they are not exercised properly. The correction of irregular teeth is the work of a specialist who can assist nature a great deal in getting the teeth in proper position.

John Henry Albers, over whose head hung a sentence of three years in prison and \$10,000 fine for violation of the espionage act, died at his home in Milwaukee. Within the last three weeks he has been paralyzed, become sightless, suffered cerebral hemorrhage and become mentally deranged.

Work on units of the Roosevelt highway, contracts for which were recently let by the state highway commission, is proceeding rapidly. On the Denmark-Sixes river road the contractors have started grading south from the Denmark cheese factory and are clearing the right of way farther along the route.

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, has advised J. L. Finney of Astoria, secretary of the Columbia river fishermen's league, that it would be necessary to obtain the signatures of 1464 qualified voters of the 29th judicial district before recall proceedings could be instituted against James A. Eakin, circuit judge. Mr. Finney's letter to the secretary of state was said to be the first public intimation that a move was on foot to recall Judge Eakin, according to Mr. Koser.

An agreement on a new discount for use in the purchase of wheat in the northwest, whereby 1/2 cent will be discounted from the purchase price for every 1/2 pound under 60 pounds to the bushel, instead of the old discount of 1 cent for every pound or fraction thereof, was reached at a conference between representatives of the farm bureau of Walla Walla county, Washington, and Umatilla county, Oregon, and grain dealers of Portland and Seattle at the Merchants exchange in Portland. The new schedule must be approved by the merchants' exchanges of Portland, Seattle and Tacoma before they can become effective.

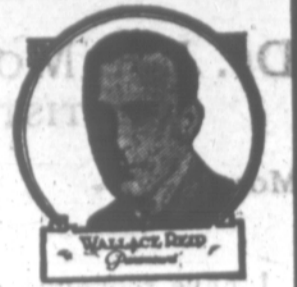
