To Talk Through Telephone. Scientific tests show that every additional inch of distance between the lips of the speaker and the mouthpiece of the telephone is equivalent to adding 120 miles of wire to the line over which one is talking. If closer than one-half inch, nasal sounds like "m" and "n" do not enter the transmitter properly.

Registration figures reveal the fact that in point of numbers the women at the Oregon normal school at Month lead the men with ratio of 19 to 1. There are just 19 men in school of a total of 361 students who have registered to date.

Estimates on the Douglas county prune crop show that the county will produce half of the prunes raised in the Pacific northwest this year. The Douglas county crop is exceeding early estimates and the predicted tonnage now stands at approximately 10,000,000 pounds.

The state irrigation securities commission, at a meeting held in Salem, voted to guarantee interest for the next six months on \$500,000 for bonds issued by the Medford irrigation district; also the interest on \$275,000 of bonds issued by the Payette Slope irrigation district.

Lumber shipments by water from the Columbia river during September were the largest in several months. Statistics compiled by Deputy Collector of Customs Karinen at Astoria, showed that in the 30 days, 65 vessels loaded at the mills in the Columbia river district, and their combined cargoes amounted to 59,092,371 feet of lumber.

Charles Park, president of the state board of horticulture has announced that it will be necessary to quarantine Malheur county on account of weevil found in alfalfa in that county, and that action will be taken at once to prevent the shipping of alfalfa into other counties. A proclamation in line with Mr. Park's suggestion probably will be issued by Governor Olcott.

The Bear Creek orchard, on the outskirts of Medford, last week received the highest price ever paid in America for a carload of pears, sold in New York and bringing a gross of \$4249. This car contained 1000 half-boxes of D'Anjou pears which sold for an average of \$4.25. This means that these pears were sold at wholesale averaging 10 cents apiece for the entire carload.

Constitutionality of the Oregon bonus law will be passed upon by the supreme court of Oregon in a friendly suit which is to be instituted in the lower courts immediately. This action was decided upon by the state bonus commission after it had been found that sale of the initial bonds waited upon such action in view of the recent New York decision against the bond issue in that state.

There were five fatalities during the week ended September 28, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Arthur Anderson, carpenter, Portland; James Fielder, logger, Brookings; C. Atterbury, airplane man, Gresham; Robert Watt, logger, Tillamook; and John H. Palme, teamster, Portland. A total of 376 accidents were reported.

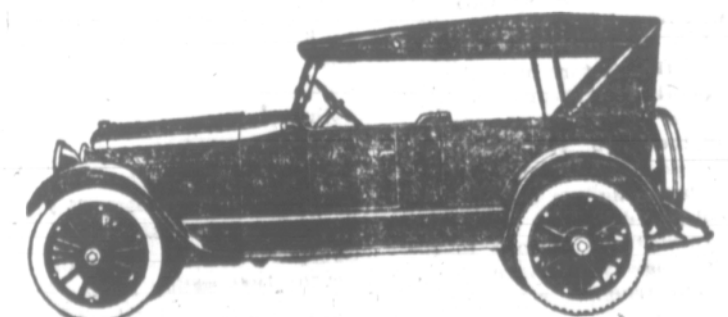

Jackson county, with a score of 96.4 out of a possible 100, walked off with first prize in the county exhibits at its year's state fair at Salem.

Jackson county's exhibits specialized in fine pears, although there were included in the exhibit some choice apples, small fruits and grains and grasses typical of that section of the state. Coos county, which featured cheese and dairy products, obtained second prize with a score of 93.3, while Douglas county was awarded third prize, with a score of 89.7.

That industrial and business conditions in Portland are on the march to normal good times following the deflation from war-time prosperity is indicated in the bank clearings for September, which showed a greater total than for any other month so far this year. Building permits also for the month were nearly a million dollars in excess of the same month last year. September also was a record month in Portland's shipping and wheat exports, for the exports were 150 per cent greater than for the same month last year.
