Moro, Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that, in pur-  
suance of the City Charter of the City  
of Moro, Sherman County, State of  
Oregon, the Common Council of said  
city has assessed upon the following  
lot, tract and parcel of land liable  
therefor its proportionate share of First  
street, as provided for in Ordinance  
No. 86B of said city, which said as-  
sessment is as follows:

Assessment for improving that por-  
tion of First Street in the City of  
Moro, Oregon, from the northwesterly  
line of the Oregon-Washington Rail-  
road and Navigation Company's right  
of way to a line parallel with and  
fifty feet easterly from the center line  
of said railroad right of way, a dis-  
tance of one hundred feet:

At any time within ten days from date hereof, application under Bonding Act to pay said assessment in ten annual installments, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable annually on all un-  
paid assessments, may be filed with the City Recorder.

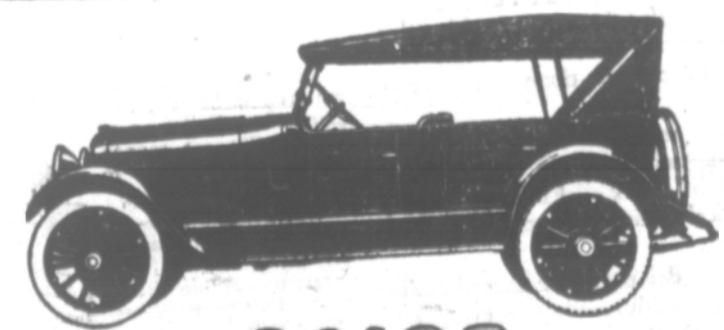
