### Presbyterians Planning Church Night

Last Sunday the people of the Presbyterian church adopted plans for a series of church nights to be observed in the near future. The plan is for six pot luck suppers to be served in the church on six successive Wednesday nights, the people gathering by families and pooling their tables, thus allowing an hour of friendly social intercourse. Following the supper the people will divide up into groups for a study hour. The Juniors will enjoy "Stay at Home Journeys." The adults will use the textbook "Established Business." If there is enough demand for it, the high school people may have a course all their own, using the book "Playing Square with Tomorrow." All these books have been written within the last seven months and are the latest facts with reference to the situation in our own country, and are written in an intensely interesting style. Some 26 families ordered books for the course at the meetings last Sunday. The series will probably begin inside of a few weeks.

Through the efforts of Senator R. N. Stanfield, the navy has made a ruling to the effect that canned cranberries may be placed on the ration list of the Navy. Previous to this time, cranberries had been listed only in fresh form, and in consequence no canned cranberries could be offered for sale for use of the Navy. The action of Senator Stanfield provides a new outlet for this already famous Oregon Product. This announcement comes as a welcome order to the personnel of the Pacific Fleet, for at holiday time many of the officers and men may be away in distant stations or in Asiatic waters far from that patriotic combination turkey and cranberry sauce. Late Pacific Coast cranberries are now appearing on the markets. The local berries are readily distinguishable from their Atlantic coast, the eastern cranberry, by the lighter color of the local fruit. This lighter color is now recognized as a distinct asset, as it gives the cooked product a much stiffer jelly hue, and also creates a saffier red hue, cranberry could produce a sauce or jelly of finer quality than those grown in our own state.

F. A. Says is in charge of the street grading crew that is busy shaping up the streets leading off the hill onto the newly improved thoroughfares. Two blocks from the Ellsworth Hotel corner to Scott street has been graded and crowned; one block on First to the Methodist church; two on McCoy street from Second to Fourth; and it is the intention to improve Fourth from the opera house to the court house. 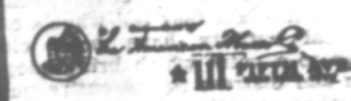

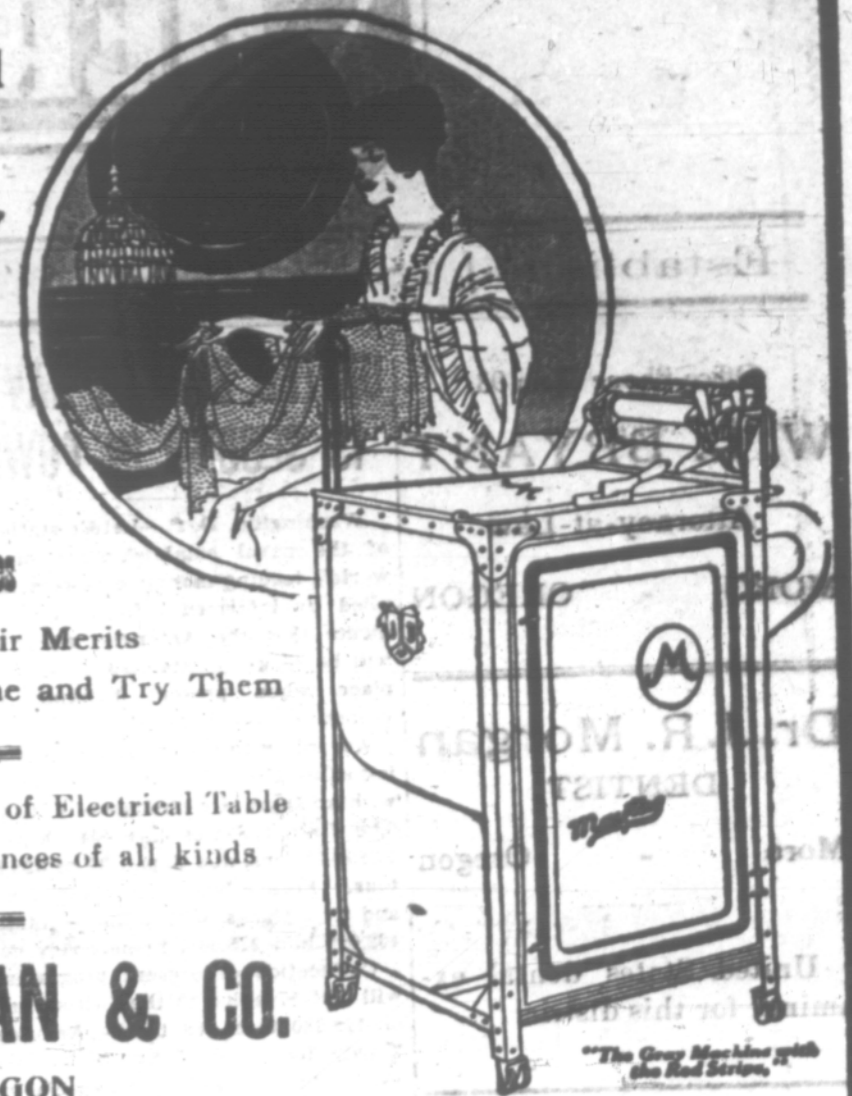
