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RED CROSS GIVES ANNUAL BUDGET

\$19,361,657 Allotted for Current Program of Relief and Service.

MILLIONS FOR VETERAN AID

Medical Aid for European Children Will Cost \$6,000,000 This Year.

Washington.—Expenditures totaling \$19,361,657 for carrying through its program of relief and service in the United States and overseas are outlined in the budget of the American Red Cross for the current fiscal year. This total is more than \$5,000,000 lower than the expenditure during the fiscal year, when the disbursements reached \$24,402,741. It is an annual National Headquarters in the United States.

Outstanding among the items of the domestic budget is the appropriation of \$3,000,000 for work in behalf of the ex-servicemen and their families. This appropriation represents the amount allotted to this work from National Headquarters only and does not take into consideration the millions being spent in chapters for relief of the World War veteran. It is in the chapter that the greater amount is spent in meeting this obligation of the Red Cross, the announcement continues, as manifested by figures of the fiscal year 1920-1921 when the total was approximately \$9,000,000, of which \$2,000,000 represented the disbursement of National Headquarters while the remainder was the chapters' contribution to this field of Red Cross service.

Vast Work for Disabled
Chief among the sub-divisions of the appropriation for work with veterans is that which concerns itself with assistance to disabled men and women in government hospitals. This item of \$1,700,000, an increase of more than \$500,000 over the appropriation for the same work in last year's budget, will provide those personal services for the disabled and their families which are indispensable to supplement those provided by the government. The director of the Veterans' Bureau has recently expressed his desire that the Red Cross should continue and extend these "humanizing services." Other items of the appropriation for veterans' relief are proportionately increased. An additional appropriation of \$400,000 has been made for Red Cross work in connection with regular Army and Navy hospitals and for disaster relief. The Red Cross has set aside for the current twelve months an appropriation of \$543,976, virtually doubling the appropriation for the same purpose for the fiscal year 1920-1921.

More than \$2,000,000 is provided for service and assistance to the 3,000 Red Cross chapters by the national organization.

Helping Destitute Children
Other items of the domestic budget include \$400,000 for miscellaneous activities, including contributions restricted for special purposes and \$768,000 for management. Each of these items represents large reductions over similar appropriations of the previous year.

From a fund of \$10,000,000, \$5,000,000 of which was contributed through the European Relief Council campaign and \$5,000,000 allotted by the Red Cross for child welfare work in Europe, there remains \$8,765,108 still available, of which it is estimated that \$6,000,000 will be required for this work during the current year. For Red Cross participation in the joint effort to relieve famine conditions in Russia, for final work in the China famine, for Junior Red Cross and other overseas activities including the closing of the old general relief program in Europe \$4,975,000 is made available.

In announcing the national budget, the Red Cross makes it clear that the figures do not include chapter expenditures or place any cash estimate on the invaluable service of volunteers in chapters.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Cook county has the largest potato crop it has ever raised. Practically all of the 2,000,000 box apple tonnage of Hood River is now in storage houses.

Work is progressing rapidly on the Pacific highway bridge to the south of Cottage Grove.

Frank Heater, chief of police of The Dalles, was shot twice in the course of a long outbreak in that city.

Gold Beach has installed electric lighting apparatus and is now the third town in Curry county to operate lights.

According to reports from Harrisburg, the 375 acres of hops in that vicinity will bring more than \$130,000.

Mrs. R. H. Schomp of Mayville took poison Wednesday and died from its effects. She is survived by a husband and four children.

Congregation of idle men in Klamath Falls will not be permitted this winter as long as there are jobs to be had says Sheriff Low.

Clackamas county walnut growers are greatly encouraged over the 1921 crop and are busily engaged in harvesting their crops.

At a sale of purebred Jerseys held recently from the McArthur & Stauffer herd, 10 miles west of Salem, the average price of cows was \$365.

Aggie Thompson, a young Indian woman of the Beatty district of Klamath county, committed suicide last week by eating wild parsnips.

A shipment of 1,055,336 Chinook salmon eggs from the McKenzie river has

been for last year. Special precautions are being taken by the Astoria police to guard against a possible tong war in Chinese circles, following the arrival of several Chinese from points in Montana where a tong war is in progress.

Nominations of George U. Piper to be collector of customs for the Willamette district, Oregon, and E. N. Wheeler to be appraiser of merchandise for the same customs district were confirmed by the senate.

Chlorination of the city water at The Dalles is recommended by Dr. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health, who characterized the water supply that feeds the first city reservoir as "a disgrace to civilization."

Crater Lake chapter of Medford and Mount Ashland chapter of Ashland, Daughters of the American Revolution, formally dedicated the monument or marker erected by them on the Pacific highway near the historic Calver property south of Phoenix, Friday at 2:30 P. M. This monument has been erected by these groups of patriotic women of southern Oregon to commemorate the work done by the first good roads builders in this part of the state.

An improvement program, the completion of which will require two years and which will involve the expenditure of nearly \$60,000, has been inaugurated by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in the Oregon City district.

There were 113,733 motor vehicles, 2998 motorcycles, 5260 chauffeurs, 175,182 operators and 508 motor vehicle dealers licensed in Oregon up to September 15 of this year, according to a report prepared by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

The bodies of 24 soldiers who lost their lives overseas arrived in Portland last week and were sent to various points in the northwest for final burial. The majority of the bodies

of Japanese and avoid being hit by oncoming autos from the rear." Lewis Hopkins Rogers, New York attorney, has presented to the state of Oregon, through Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, manuscript consisting of between 80,000 and 100,000 words and more than 100 photographs descriptive of the eventful five-year cruise of the United States battleship Oregon. The manuscript was given to the state upon the condition that it be published in book form.

In view of requests received at the executive offices that a proclamation be issued asking the people of Oregon to observe November 11 in honor of the Americans who gave up their lives in the world war, Governor Olcott has issued a statement to the effect that the last legislative act of the legislature day as a legal holiday. As a result, the governor said, it was unnecessary that he issue a proclamation.

Oregon has the lowest percentage of infant mortality of any state in the union that registers its births and deaths with the federal government, according to the report made by the department of commerce for last year. For 1920 the report showed a total of 14,942 births in Oregon, an increase of 1402 over 1919. The total deaths of infants under one year of age in 1920 was 924, or 6.2 per 1000 births.

There were six fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents in the week ending October 20, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were H. H. Hulbert, salesman, Gladstone; G. W. Sadtler, laborer, Elgin; A. H. Canfield, edgerman; W. R. Porter, logger, Portland; Robert D. Cook, logger, Powers, and Ernest Meier, logger, Silverton. A total of 387 accidents were reported.

John Rathle and Elvie Kirby, alias James Owens, were taken to Pendleton Sunday where they were sentenced to hang for the part they played in the murder of Sheriff T. H. Taylor of Umatilla county. Rathle and Kirby were convicted for the murder of Sheriff Taylor more than a year ago and were sentenced by Judge Phelps to hang. They later appealed their cases to the supreme court, with the result that the verdict of the lower court was affirmed. It was necessary to remove them to Umatilla county to reentence them and a new date of execution fixed by the court.

HOLDS WILDERNESS IN SCORN

Japanese Adventurer Thieves on Such Perils as Might Well Daunt Even the Brave.

Juifro Wada has always played a lone hand. Up and down the northern fringes of civilization he has pioneered for 30 years. He has been in the thick of every gold rush from the Klondike to Hanson Creek. He is an expert trapper, hunter, cook, prospector and dog-team driver. From Athabasca to the mouth of the Mackenzie, all old-timers know the little yellow wilderness adventurer.

Soon after the discovery of a gusher well at Fort Norman last fall, winter closed the trails to the new oil bonanza on the Mackenzie. But it did not shut out Juifro Wada. Ice and snow and howling blizzards have no terrors for him. Employed by Vancouver capitalists to go to Fort Norman and stake claims for them, he struck out for Peace river with a team of dogs in the dead of winter. For 1200 miles he mused alone through the frozen, wolf-haunted solitudes, staked his claims and came back across the snow to Peace river.

Now he has been employed by a New York syndicate to go to the top of the world on a hunt for gold. A rumor has long been bruited about the arctic that Herschel Island conceals rich gold deposits. The little Jap will spend at least a year on this thunder-riven, desolate rock in the arctic seas. If he uncovers treasure, there will be no delay in bringing out samples. No matter if it is 90 degrees below, Juifro Wada will harness up his malamutes and break trail back toward civilization. That's his way.
