Grass Valley Visited by Fire

Fire destroyed the two-story brick building at Grass Valley early Sunday morning, it being discovered about two o'clock by Merle Bolshie as he was returning home from the dance held that Saturday night in the municipal auditorium. When first discovered it was burning all through the rear of the building and shortly the entire building and contents was a total ruin.

The building was occupied by the Q. and V. store, carrying \$15,000 insurance; the M. B. O'Brien hardware, carrying \$10,000 insurance, and the Citizens bank, insurance not stated. Besides these, a loss was incurred by the Crandall Undertaking Co., of The Dalles, who had a stock of goods in the building. The building was also insured for \$9,000 and was owned by L. Barnum, E. O. McCoy, H. S. Rice, and F. G. Dick of The Dalles.

The fire was spectacular, made so by the quantity of oils in the hardware basement and the small arm ammunition that was constantly exploding while volunteer firemen fought the blaze.

As a result of the fire the power and light line of the Snerman Electric Co. went out of commission about noon when a wall fell carrying down the lines of the company and causing a short circuit that blew a fuse at the Dufur substation. Although several of these fuses were on hand at Dufur the men in charge at the time could not find them until late in the afternoon.

All of the valuable papers and records of the Citizens Bank were in the vault and when this was opened up and allowed to cool, very little if any damage to the papers was noted. The total loss of buildings and property owned by tenants is estimated to be about \$50,000 but the large loss occasioned by the disaster will be to the community at large in the property loss to the city and the business life of south Sherman County.

Churches Adopt Armament Resolution

The following is a copy of resolutions passed by the congregation present Sunday evening at the united meeting of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches at Moro, Oregon, November 6th, 1921, and sent to each of the American delegates to the Conference on Armaments at Washington, D. C.

Whereas our President, Warren G. Harding, has called together an International Conference on the Reduction of Armaments, to meet in Washington, D. C., on November 12, 1921, to which Conference you have been appointed as one of the American Delegates, and hence our representative; and

Whereas we recognized the far-reaching possibilities of this Conference just now to stop the world in its mad career for armaments, and to start it on a new program for peace and good will among nations;

Therefore We, the congregation of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches of Moro, Oregon, in union meeting assembled, hereby put ourselves on record as follows:

We believe in gradual, but speedy reduction of armaments in conjunction with other leading nations, as the crying need of our day to put off, and if possible, to prevent future wars.

We believe in international law, courts of justice, and boards of arbitration for the settlement of disputes, and an Association of Nations for the conservative of peace.

We believe the United States, because of its strategic position in the world, both politically and geographically, should set the example and express its willingness to go as far as any other leading nation, or even farther, in any sane cooperative plan for the successful reduction of armaments.

To the exertion of your influence both political and personal, for the attainment of the above desires, we pledge our hearty approval and moral support, and with this in view we pray for the success of the Conference in the handling of the complicated problems that come to it for solution.

Signed on behalf of the congregation assembled this sixth day of November, Nineteen Hundred and twenty one. Pastor Presbyterian Church, Pastor Methodist Church.

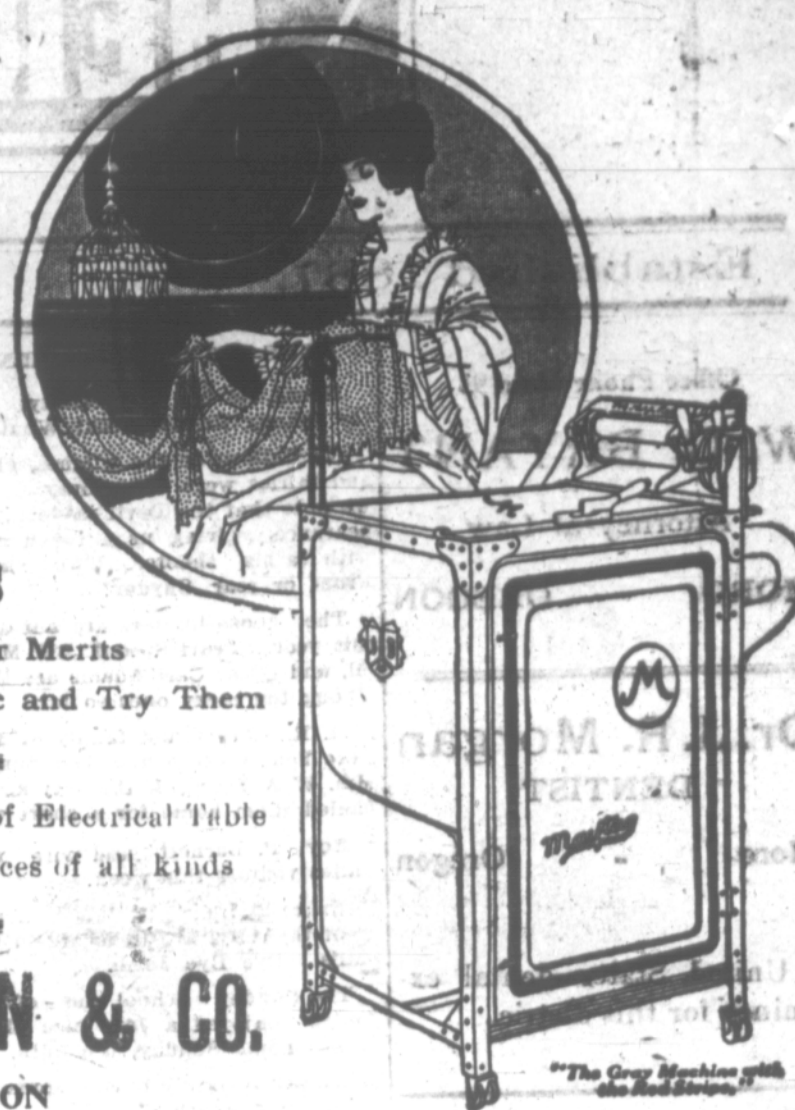
