Road Walkers Rule is the Left Side

Few people who travel the highways on foot seem to be aware of the new law providing that pedestrians shall keep to the left hand side of the road instead of the right, as was the old law. This results in much danger for all pedestrians and much concern is felt by motorists for the safety of the pedestrians who walk the highways these days. The law gives people on foot a right of way all their own besides making driving easier, and motorists are puzzled that so few people are aware that they are clear out of their rights if they fail to observe the "left hand" side.

For those who do not know, the following rule from "Rules of the Road," taken from section 2, subdivision 26, of the Motor Vehicle Laws of 1921, is given:

Pedestrians, when using any highway outside of incorporated cities or towns shall use the left hand side of such highway, so as to leave the right hand side of the highway free for vehicles passing in the same direction and for safety in meeting vehicles proceeding in the opposite direction.

As a result of non-compliance with this new rule two women walking on the "right" hand side of the road were killed on the highway near Portland recently by cars coming up behind them in the dark.

Church Activities

In the meantime it was decided that all who join before January first will be considered charter members of the society. In addition to the Sunday evening prayer meetings, already started, it is expected that regular monthly socials will be held, and a fine big social in the near future is already under consideration.

The Dorcas Society of the Presbyterian church will hold their annual sale of articles and food this Saturday afternoon at the church. The community Christmas tree will be held at the School Auditorium on Friday evening, Dec. 23, at 7:30 p.m. The committee is already hard at work on a fine program to be rendered that evening. An offering for the starving people of the Near East will be taken at that time.

The film, "Behold the Man," which is to be given at the Moro Theater under the auspices of the American Legion, bids fair to draw a tremendous crowd. The people of the churches certainly want to see it a member. It is an experience of a life time to see the whole life of our Savior presented from beginning to end in film.

Last Sunday morning revealed an unusually large attendance of people at Sunday School. However, there are still some about town who were not there. Classes of all ages are open to more comers.

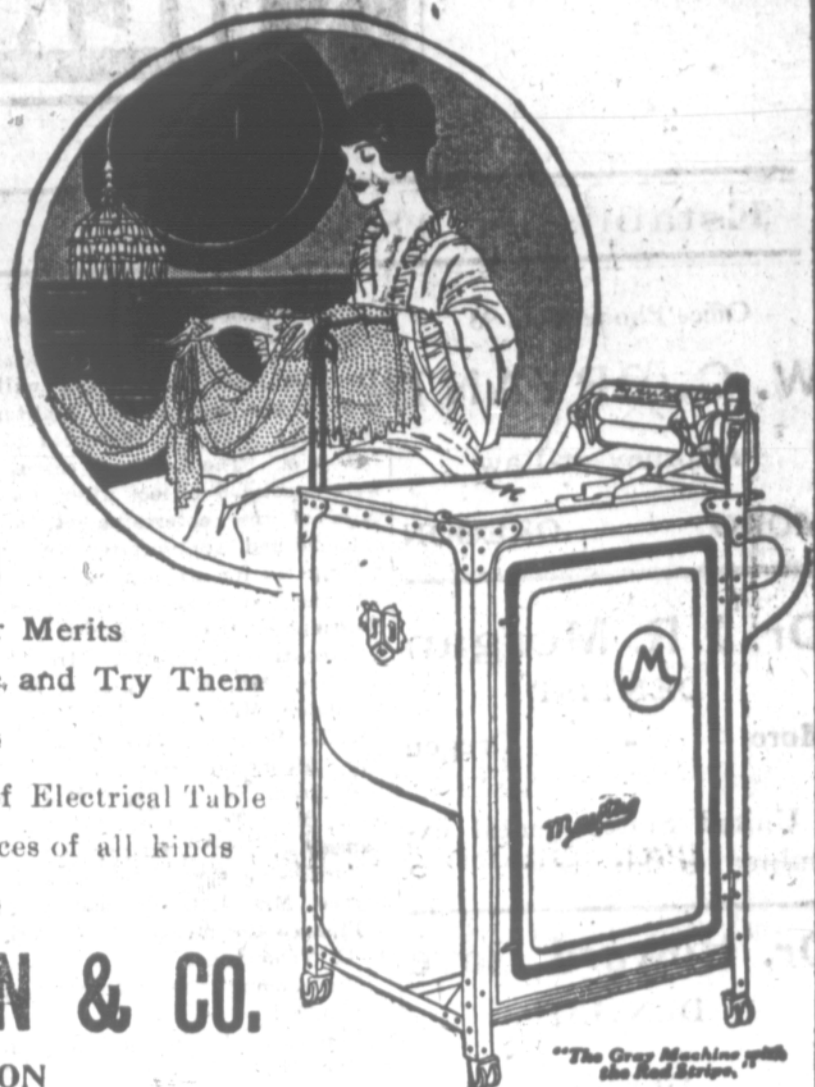
