It will be a trunk sewer for all the property in the south and west part of the city. G. B. Bourhill, O. L. Belshie and Otto Peetz have been appointed a committee to assess the property benefited.

L. W. Ross is the possessor of one of the first two hundred "peace" dollars released from the U. S. Treasury, receiving it as a gift from a Chicago wholesale jewelry house. The new coin is more attractive and a more artistic creation than the old dollar in that it represents a newer and more advanced school of art. Outstanding features are, on the obverse, the face and bearing of the wife of Francisco, the artist who designed the coin, portraying, as the artist saw it, the new spirit of peace that has come to the world, and on the reverse, the Eagle has returned from his peering flight and rests with folded wings. Beyond him a new sun is rising, denoting the dawn of a brighter era for humankind. It is rumored that this coin is to be withdrawn because the designer placed his initials upon the face of it. Such action would place it at a premium, possibly doubling or trebling its value.

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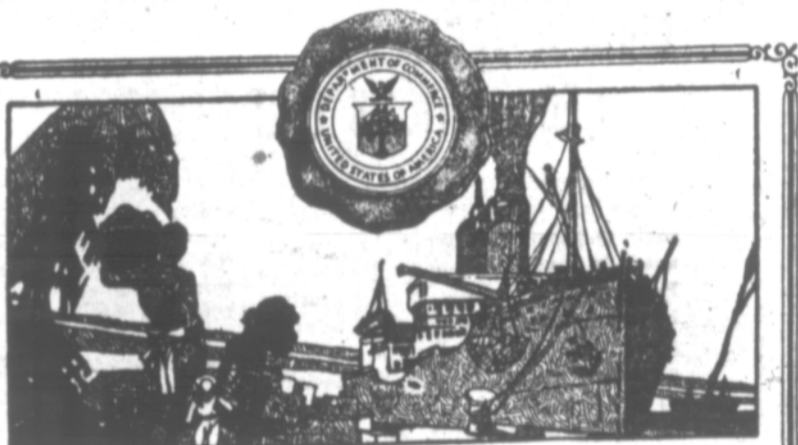
