W. C. Helyer and W. K. Haggerty were Grass Valley visitors between trains Wednesday.

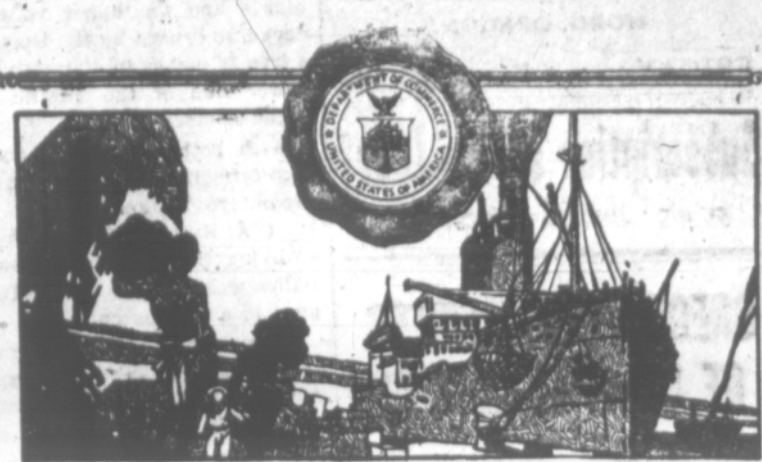
