Federation topped all spring wheats
under the high irrigated conditions of
the Aberdeen experiment station in
1921. Federation yielded 79.7 bushels
an acre; this was 19.4 more than Mar-
quis, 17.4 more than Bluestem, 11.7
bushels an acre better than Dicklow.

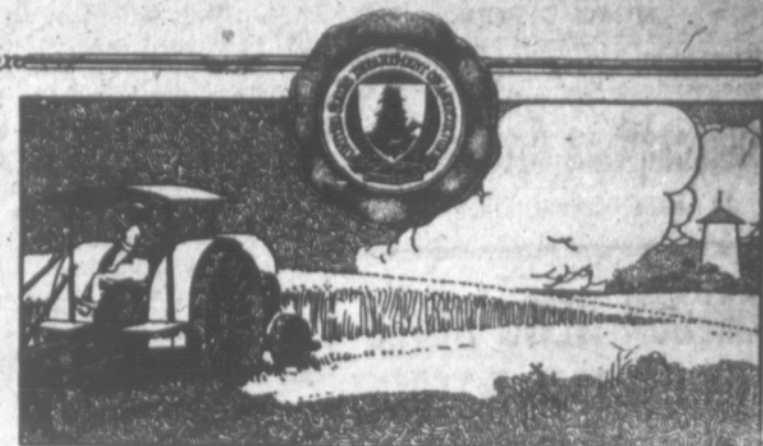
