English cedar, California redwood,

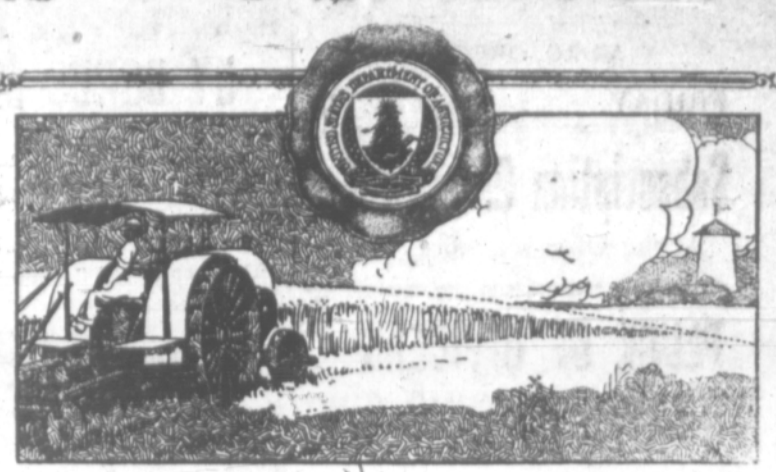
linden, myrtle, arbor vitae, black
