Umatilla now has a new modern ferry installed at the old ferry site on the Columbia river. By using this as a substitute for the Wallula cut-off, from 26 to 91 miles is saved to autoists traveling into Washington out of Oregon.

O. B. Robertson, state bank examiner, was in Moro Thursday on business connected with the state banking department. At the present time Mr. Robertson is located at The Dalles where he has charge of the liquidation of the French & Co. bank.

A second \$3,000,000, of the first ten million dollars of ex-service men's aid bonds, were signed and delivered to the purchasers in Portland this week. A large part of the money derived from the sale of the first three million issue has already been expended in paying applications for cash bonus.

Funeral services were held in Wasco Wednesday morning for Frank Yurkie, under the direction of the Crandall undertaking company. Mr. Yurkie, whose home was at Spokane, had been visiting with his brothers, Albert and Harry, when he succumbed to cancer of the spine with which he had been afflicted for some time.

The full length of the Columbia river highway in Hood River county has been cleared of snow and ice by maintenance workers under the direction of J. R. Nickelsen. Crews are now engaged between Hood River and Mosier, clearing away the debris left by the slides. \$10,000 was the estimate made by Nickelsen of the cost of clearing the highway in Hood River county.

M. Fitzmaurice was in town this week and, in his capacity as appraiser for the Federal Loan bank at Spokane, Washington, was passing on lands in the Kent district that were offered for loans. He stated that Sherman county was one of the best in his district within which to make appraisements, primarily because each parcel of land was generally square, accessible to railroads and close to county roads and that the land was easily viewed as a whole. Security for loans aggregating approximately \$85,000 were appraised during his visit.

Dr. C. L. Poley was called to Portland Tuesday to be present at an operation submitted to by Mrs. J. F. Foss on Wednesday. The operation disclosed a severe hemorrhage of the brain. Whether it was one large hemorrhage or several small ones could not be determined. A transfusion of blood was made to Mrs. Foss from her daughter Marguerite Wednesday afternoon. The operation was a success insofar as relieving the pressure on the brain was concerned, but a permanent result will depend upon the extent of Mrs. Foss' rallying from the operation. At present all developments are favorable.

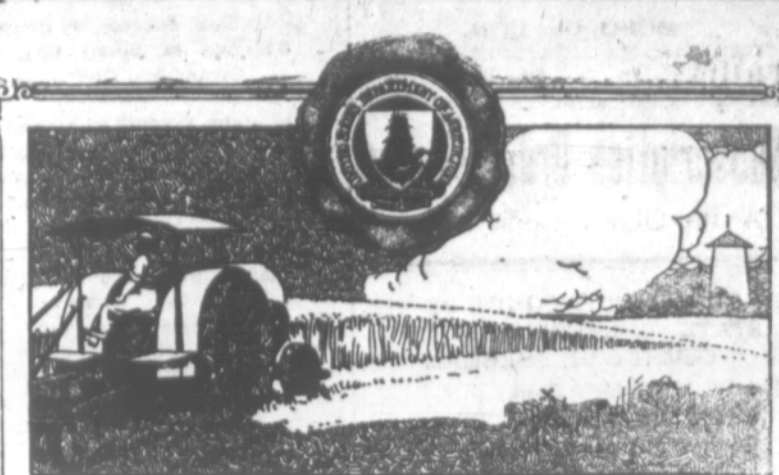
A surprisingly low income from 113 representative farms was averaged in 1921, according to Professor Gunn, farm management demonstrator at the Oregon Agricultural college. An average of \$465 from these farms, scattered over 16 counties, represents what the farmer received, for the labor of his family in addition to his own, and for the interest on his investment. The 20 records from eastern Oregon showed a net loss of \$367.

Cyde (Red) Rupert, who was received at the Oregon state penitentiary at Salem March 6, 1918, to serve an indeterminate term of from one to three years for the theft of approximately \$15,000 of liberty bonds from the Northwestern National bank in Portland, later sent to the federal prison at McNeil's island under a six-year sentence on a similar charge, was pardoned from the latter institution March 2 of this year.

The Oregon public service commission has issued permits to 16 operators of passenger automobile stages and truck lines, under the provisions of the transportation act enacted at the recent special session of the legislature. In each instance the applicants for permits furnished "good faith" bonds and liability insurance satisfactory to the commission. The permits cover commercial lines in practically every section of the state.
