STATION INSTALLS STILL

The local experiment station has recently installed electric equipment for a still and soil oven. The still is not used to manufacture the usual product, but for making distilled water needed for soil nitrate analysis. The soil oven and still were formerly equipped with gasoline burners. Electricity serves the purpose much better and does away with the danger of explosion and fire, always present when gasoline is used.

The soil moisture and nitrate investigations at the station are being done by Mr. G. A. Mitchell. Much valuable data, which will later be published in a bulletin, is being obtained on the way different methods of soil tillage influence the moisture and plant food in the soil.

Church News

The Presbyterians are planning for an Easter program to be given Easter Sunday, April 16th. It is intended to place this program in charge of the Sunday School. The church and the Sunday School will meet in one service that day; the hour set for the exercises being 10:30. A special offering for foreign missions will be taken at that time.

Another pre-Easter sermon will be given next Sunday morning at the Presbyterian church by Rev. Henry G. Hanson, the theme being "Life thru Death."

On Friday evening, April 14th, a special Good Friday service will be held at the Presbyterian church, at 8 o'clock. The pastor will preach on "Three Thoughts Form the Cross." Mrs. Roy Kunsman will sing "Bearing His Cross," a solo specially appropriate to the message.

The Union meeting next Sunday evening at the Presbyterian church will take place at 8 o'clock. The sermon will be by Rev. U. C. Smothers on "Heaven."

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The annual congregational meeting of Moro Presbyterian church was held in the church auditorium last Thursday evening following a pot-luck supper served in the basement of the church.

Several were present from the country in spite of the bad roads caused that evening by a heavy rain.

Leaders in the various departments of church activities made concise and interesting reports of their departmental work for the past year. C. J. Thompson made the report for the officers; G. B. Bourhill for the trustees; Mrs. T. C. Lee for the Cradle Roll; G. B. Coleman for the Home Department; Miss Ruth McClelland for the Young People's Society, which is conducted jointly with the Methodist church; Reverend Hanson read the pastor's report.

The reports showed an enrollment in Sunday School of 88, average winter month attendance 68; Cradle Roll enrollment 41, of which 11 were added last year; Home Department enrollment 18, several out of town and some reached by mail.

Officers elected for the ensuing year terms were R. C. Byers and M. G. Melzer as elders; trustees: Eugene Amidon, Dewey Thompson, G. B. Bourhill, Hans Thompson Otto Peetz; treasurer, G. B. Bourhill; assistant treasurer, A. C. Thompson.

Financial reports for the year show receipts by the church trustees to be \$2878.01, balance on hand \$38.67, Sunday School receipts during the year, \$290.95, balance on hand \$48.80. Dorcas Society receipts during the year \$267.82, balance on hand \$108.75. A budget presented by the trustees for the ensuing year amounting to \$2861.40 was adopted.

The officers of the church were instructed to take steps to celebrate on July 10, 1922, the 35th anniversary of the church organization. A vote of thanks was extended the Methodist church for their helpful cooperation during the past year. A vote of sympathy was extended to Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Foss and family in the serious illness of Mrs. Foss.

Rev. B. F. Harper from Milton hereupon took charge of the meeting, upon the withdrawal of Reverend Hanson, and the business of choosing a permanent pastor was taken up. Rev. Henry G. Hanson was quickly chosen by motion duly seconded and a unanimous ballot vote of all present, at the present salary with one month's vacation each year and free use of the manse. The elders and trustees were instructed to sign the call and C. J. Thompson was designated to prosecute the same at Presbytery.
