The county has dismantled its rock crusher at Hockman's farm, moving parts of the outfit to Fulton canyon and part to Rufus.

A card received from W. F. Jackson states that they are leaving Long Beach, California, on April 24th, and expect to arrive in Moro about May 1.

In honor of Easter Sunday and Mr. Fortner's 32d birthday—Easter Sunday and the 32d birthday anniversary of F. E. Fortner were simultaneous events this year.

Friends were pleased to welcome home Mrs. J. F. Foss last Saturday from St. Vincent hospital, where she recently underwent a serious operation for hemorrhage of the brain.

Plans are being made preliminary to advertising for bids for the construction of a large septic tank by the city at the foot of 5th street, back of the Tumalum Lumber Co. property.

N. P. Hansen and wife and daughter were visitors from Portland in Moro Easter Sunday. They returned via auto Monday morning, accompanied by Rev. H. G. Hanson, who later returned to Moro on the train.

W. H. Williams, proprietor of the repair department of the Moro Deschutes garage, has added a dust-proof paint room for the convenience of car owners, where they can have their cars painted by any one they select or do it themselves.

Condon will play a return game of baseball at the fair grounds with the Moro nine Sunday, April 30th. On the 16th Moro defeated Condon on their own grounds, so Condon may be expected to come over strong to prevent a repetition of the first game.

Sixteen head of horses were taken off the Sherman highway work by the owners Tuesday, on the section known as the Wagner contract. This layoff resulted in the loss of one day, until 28 head of horses from The Dalles were put on to replace those taken off.

Property owners are petitioning the city for construction of a sewer on 5th street that will serve the city from the court house to the railroad. At the last meeting of the council a survey was ordered and when this report is submitted definite action will be taken.

Arlington's baseball nine will come to Moro to play against Manager Mathews' local team next Sunday. Mayor N. W. Thompson will deliver the first ball and Justice L. W. Ross will receive the same, at 2:30 o'clock sharp. This game opens the season in Moro and a good crowd is expected.

A. S. Johnson is having more than the usual amount of trouble in drilling the new city well, which is now down about 60 feet. The drill struck a sand pocket which made casing of the hole necessary, but still the sand has hindered operations until enough was taken out by the drilling tools to undermine the drill machine. The ground has settled several feet under the drill and leaves a hole that is about eight feet across at the top.

Contractors have begun to rock surface the Sherman highway grade, starting at the DeMoss cut-off. The intention is to surface the new grade from DeMoss towards Wasco, and to complete that part first. This grade is now ready for surfacing as far as the Hugh Walker place, with the exception of a small section near the top of DeMoss hill. It is thought that the grade will be all finished as far as Wasco ahead of the surfacing crew.

Henry Root, one of the pioneer homesteaders of Sherman county, and a cousin of Elihu Root, the American statesman, died Saturday night at his farm home four miles west of Wasco. Mr. Root was eighty years old at the time of his passing. He crossed the plains with an ox team caravan in 1852, moving to Sherman county in 1881. Three children survive him: William D., George H., and Mrs. H. E. Morrow. The funeral was held Thursday afternoon at the Wasco Methodist church, interment being made in the Wasco cemetery.

Roy Rannells, residing near Redmond, was a business visitor in the county last week, checking up on the earnings of four head of horses he thought were working on the Sherman highway grading. The man who had been placed in charge of Rannells' four head of horses, two sets of harness and wagon could not be found. Rannells found one team at work at DeMoss, in charge of Mr. Wing, who had traded for them. Another team and the harness and wagon had been traded to E. P. Rich of Wasco for a Dodge car and \$125. The car had been driven to The Dalles and sold for \$150. Sherman and Wasco county sheriffs are looking for the men who conducted the financial transactions. Mr. Rich has started proceedings to regain his car.

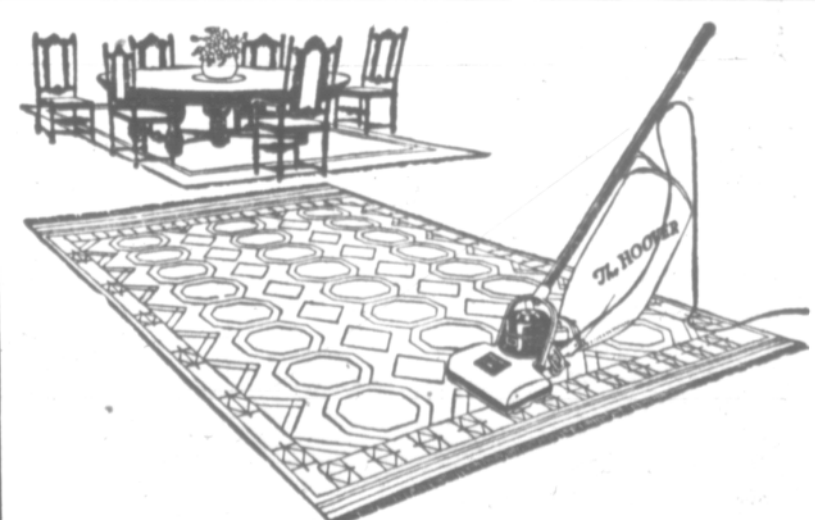
