PRESIDENT SIGNS NARCOTICS BILL

Washington, D. C.—Signature by President Harding of the bill recently passed by congress to strengthen the Harrison anti-narcotic act was announced at the White House.

The new law establishes a federal narcotics board to be composed of the heads of the state, treasury and commerce departments, which is empowered to authorize the importation of such quantities of crude opium and coca leaves as may be found necessary for medical and other legitimate purposes. Any alien convicted of violating the act is to be deported, while for others a fine of \$5000 or ten years' imprisonment is provided.

The president also has signed the department of interior appropriation bills.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Last week 28 deaths from violence occurred in Belfast, Ireland.

Alice Robertson, the only woman member of congress, has accepted an invitation to represent President Harding at the Portland (Or.) rose festival.

The senate banking and currency committee ordered reported the senate bill authorizing the director of the mint to coin 100,000 50-cent pieces in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of President Rutherford B. Hayes.

Conductor J. A. Allison and Engineer Tom Allen, veteran employees of the O. W. & N., who were dismissed by officials of that road following the disastrous wreck near Celilo, December 1, in which seven persons were killed and 73 injured, have returned to work with full rights restored.

House Sends Reply to Shoals Bidders. Washington, D. C.—Bidders competing for development by private enterprise of the government \$106,000,000 war initiated projects at Muscle Shoals, Alabama, received their answers from the house military committee in the form of a counter-proposal framed by the committee. None of the offers submitted by the bidders and forwarded to congress by Secretary Weeks for final decision was found acceptable. That made by Henry Ford came closest to winning the award in that it was made the basis upon which the committee based its reply.

Epsom Salt Beds Found Near Bend. Bend, Or.—Enough Epsom salts to supply the world, table salt sufficient for all central Oregon at least and a valuable salt of potassium of quantity not yet determined—these are the mineral ingredients of two small lakes nine or ten miles beyond Fort Rock, reports W. A. Beaver.

Dallas Has \$30,000 Blaze. Dallas, Or.—Nearly one-half block of business houses on the north side of Court street in this city was destroyed by fire which started, shortly after noon Saturday in the restaurant of Stanton & Arnold. The loss was \$30,000, partly covered by insurance.

Governor Olcott's Lead 521. Salem, Or.—Governor Ben Olcott's plurality is 521 votes over Charles Hall of Marshfield on complete official returns from all counties in the state on their race for the republic nomination for governor in the primary.

S. P. IS ORDERED TO DIVORCE C. P.

Decision of the Supreme Court Breaks Up Control of Competitive Lines.

Washington, D. C.—Dissolution of ownership and control of the Central Pacific railway by the Southern Pacific company was ordered by the supreme court in an opinion delivered by Justice Day. The decision in the case which was the last of the railroad merger suits to come before the court, held that the two lines were competitive. Justices McReynolds and Brandeis, because of their official connections prior to going upon the bench, did not participate. Justice McKenna delivered a short dissent.

The court directed that a decree be entered severing the control by the Southern Pacific of the Central Pacific by stock ownership or by lease, but in accomplishing that end so far as compatible, said the mortgage lien in the Union Trust company of New York should be protected.

The case had been pending in the courts since February 11, 1914, when the United States asked the United States district court of Utah to restrain the two railroads, the Union Trust company of New York, and the directors and officials of the Southern Pacific under the Sherman anti-trust and the Pacific railroad act. The United States asserted that the lines of the two railroads constituted competitive systems and added that the ownership acquired by the Southern Pacific of a controlling interest in the Central Pacific was declared unlawful.

PORTLAND BALL CLUB HEADS ARE OUSTED

Portland, Or.—The decision by Judge Kenesaw M. Landis, baseball high commissioner, in the Kenworthy case is unparalleled in its severity.

According to his verdict, W. H. Klepper, president of the Portland baseball club, must retire from baseball. He will be placed on the ineligible list and will not be reinstated until January 1, 1925.

James R. Brewster of Seattle, vice president of the Portland baseball club, is placed on the ineligible list and will not be reinstated until January 1, 1924.

Kenworthy is placed on the ineligible list until January 1, 1924, but can return to the game as a player, not as a manager, August 1 of this year, if Landis is convinced that Klepper and Brewster have absolutely retired from baseball, either actively or passively, according to his order.

AUTO FORFEITURES LEGAL

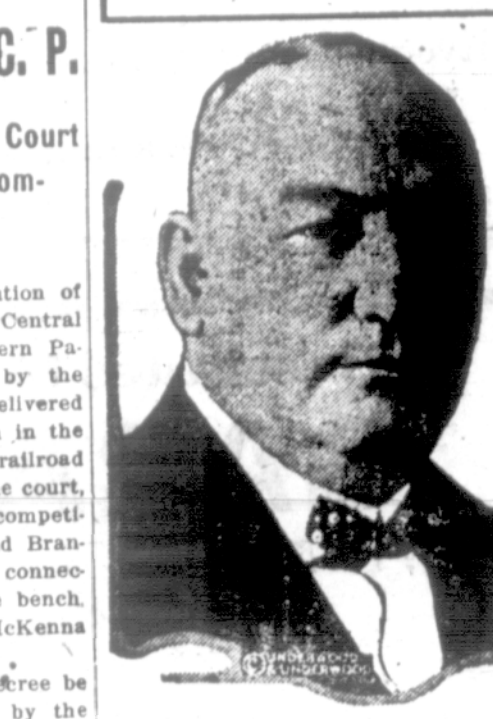
Court Upholds Condemnation of Machine Bearing Liquor.

Butte, Mont.—G. M. Bourquin, judge of the United States district court, has handed down an opinion upholding forfeiture and condemnation of an automobile owned by Harvey Noble in which liquor is alleged to have been transported contrary to law. Noble had been charged, tried and acquitted of transporting intoxicating liquor, and the issue was on recovery of the automobile which had been libeled. The court ruled that identity of fact and law is not established in the two cases and orders the automobile forfeited and condemned.

Washington Farms Aggregate 54,513. Olympia, Wash.—Washington, an agricultural and dairying state, had 54,513 farms reporting a total of 572,644 head of cattle, according to figures compiled by J. S. McIntosh, deputy commissioner of the state bureau of statistics and immigration in the office of Secretary of State Hinkle from 1920 farm census statistics just received. The average is 10.5 head of cattle to the farm or two head less than the average for all farms in the United States.

To Report McCumber Bonus Proposal. Washington, D. C.—The McCumber soldier bonus bill probably will be reported to the senate by the finance committee this week. At a meeting of the full committee it was clearly indicated that democratic members of the committee would vote for the McCumber plan of paying the bonus with long time certificates having a loan value, in preference to the Smoot 20-year insurance plan, with no loan provision.

SEVEN MEN KILLED IN STEAMER COLLISION

Portland, Or.—Seven sailors were killed aboard the steamer Welsh Prince and three firemen were injured at 10:45 P. M. Sunday night when the steamer Welsh Prince and the steamer Lohan met in the Columbia river in head-on collision off Altona, Wash.

The injured firemen were placed aboard the tug Oncocta, which had rushed from Astoria to the scene of the collision, and were taken to an Astoria hospital for treatment.

The killed and injured were crushed when the ships came together. They were asleep in the fore-castle of the Welsh Prince. The killed men were said to have been new members of the crew taken aboard before the steamer left Portland.

FARM TARIFF BLOC WINS

Finance Committee Majority Meets First Reverse.

Washington, D. C.—The republican agricultural tariff bloc won its first fight in the senate and the finance committee majority met its first reverse since consideration of the tariff bill was begun five weeks ago.

With the aid of a solid democratic vote and some non-member republicans, the tariff bloc succeeded in having cyanide restored to the free list. An amendment by Senator Oddie, republican, Nevada, to strike out the committee amendment proposing to make this commodity dutiable at the rate of 10 per cent ad valorem, was approved, 46 to 14.

In its fight to advance the rate on magnesia from \$25 a ton to \$10 a ton—the house rate—the tariff bloc had the support not only of some eastern republicans, but also of four democrats—Broussard, Louisiana; Ashurst, Arizona; Jones, New Mexico, and Pittman, Nevada.

Russo-German Pact Defended.

Berlin.—Addressing the Reichstag for the first time since the Genoa conference adjourned, Chancellor Joseph Wirth defended the Russo-German treaty and declared that "Germany had been driven into the pact for self-defense by the entente powers."
